

Jesus is Risen

One of the earliest cries of Jesus' followers was 'Christ is risen: he is risen indeed!' We will be celebrating this on Easter Sunday (I am assuming you are reading this before Easter), the greatest day of celebration in the Christian calendar. But why is the crucified Jesus being raised back to life of such importance not just to the Christian faith but to history?

I have never been able to separate Good Friday and Easter Sunday – their events are together the ultimate expression of God's plan for our world and all who've ever lived.

Good Friday appeared to be the end of the road for Jesus. There was nothing more humiliating, and of course torturous, than the excruciating death on a cross. He was betrayed, convicted by a kangaroo court, scoffed at, and ultimately left abandoned to die in shame. He alone knew that he was carrying the sins of the whole world as he became the ultimate sacrifice. It is so significant that when he died, the curtain in the Temple was torn in two from top to bottom — no human could have done it. In being that sacrificial lamb that only a perfect God could be, Jesus had made the inaccessible accessible; anyone who chose to follow him could now know God for themselves and be forgiven.

Even Jesus' disciples and closest friends thought Good Friday was the end, not that they would ever had called it good. It looked like it was all over. None of them expected what happened next, even though Jesus had told them.

If Jesus' death was the ultimate sacrifice, bringing God's forgiveness and life, then his resurrection is the ultimate victory. He has defeated death and the powers of evil that just days earlier, seeing him die, thought they had outwitted God himself.

The resurrected Jesus, still alive today, has shown himself to be Lord and King. He's the one in charge of the universe, he's the one who one day will


return in such power and majesty that no one will be in doubt. That's when the full significance of his resurrection will be seen.


Of course, we don't yet fully see Jesus' victory. Our world is full of evil as well as good. Yes, Jesus is alive and actively working to build his kingdom, yes he is changing lives and bringing forgiveness, hope and purpose, yet we still see the spiritual battle that the New Testament writers (and Jesus himself) tell us will be a constant in our times.

In the challenges of life, hold on to the remarkable truth that Jesus is risen! He has won the supreme victory and we can be assured that he is truly in control. So this Easter, take some time to thank him for dying in your place, for the life he has given you and his certain promise of an eternity with Him.

KNOW YOUR NUMBERS!

This month I 'd like to talk about blood pressure! Some of you know I work as a pre-assessment nurse in my other role, and I have to take a detailed assessment of patients wanting to have planned surgeries such as hip/knee replacements. It always surprises me when a patient is taking medication for high blood pressure but have no idea what their personal blood pressure is or what the reading actually means in regard to their health. High blood pressure isn't usually something you can feel or notice, but if yours is elevated you are more at risk of a heart attack or stroke and that's why it's important to know your numbers!

So, what is high blood pressure?

Blood pressure is how doctors describe how hard your blood is being pushed through your arteries, the tubes that carry blood from your heart to the rest of your body. High blood pressure is also referred to as hypertension. Your blood carries oxygen to your heart and brain. If these tubes become narrowed or blocked with fatty material less oxygen will get to them, causing a stroke if blood flow to your brain is restricted, or a heart attack if blood flow to your heart is restricted. High blood pressure can cause your heart to become enlarged, which in turn can make it less effective at pumping which can lead to heart failure.

What does my blood pressure reading mean?

When you have your blood pressure taken you might see the reading written down as something like 140/90 or hear it said as "140 over 90".

The first or top number is the pressure when your blood pressure is at its highest (when your heart squeezes). The second lower number is the pressure when your blood pressure is at its lowest (your heart relaxes).

What should my blood pressure be?

Unless your GP tells you differently, it should be around 140/90 mmHG If its higher than this your doctor may tell you, you have high blood pressure. If you have a problem with your heart or arteries like coronary artery disease, diabetes, or kidney disease your blood pressure should be below 130/80mmHG.

What does high blood pressure feel like?

Most people can't feel their blood pressure is raised and only find out when it's checked. In some rare cases, someone with high blood pressure might have: Blurred vision, Nose bleeds, Shortness of breath, A persistent headache.

See your GP or practice nurse if this happens to you. And be persistent, I know it can often be difficult to get an appointment, and GP practices are overwhelmed at times. But this is your health, and its good to take responsibility for it!

Why is my blood pressure high?

These things affect your blood pressure: being overweight, too much salt in your diet, not being physically active, smoking, and drinking too much alcohol. If a close family member has high blood pressure you may be more likely to have it.

Try these simple things to help lower your blood pressure.

- Drink less alcohol.
- Eat a diet filled with fresh fruit and veg, less saturated fat, and foods lower in salt.
- be active for 150 minutes a week. Activities that make you feel warmer, breathe harder and make your heart beat faster.
- Stop smoking, to lessen your risk of a heart attack or stroke. Smoking can cause your blood vessels to become clogged up quicker.
- Blood pressure medication.

Your GP may suggest taking a medication to control or lower your blood pressure. Don't forget to take it regularly as it will help cut your risk of a heart attack of a heart attack or stroke. But don't forget to also get more active and eat well too!

So....don't forget......KNOW YOUR NUMBERS! Find out your blood pressure particularly if you are on medication, your nurse will be only too happy to tell you. I purchased my blood pressure machine from the British Heart Foundation for £35 online. Let me know if you would like one if you don't have access to a computer, and I will order you one. I am in the process of buying a larger cuff for my machine and will be available for a blood pressure check in church in the coming weeks. If you do possess a machine and your blood pressure is raised its always useful to take some readings over several days (take it twice daily) for your GP/nurse to look at.

RESPONSE FROM SAMARITAN'S PURSE

With heartfelt thanks to everyone who responded to the call for donations of medicines and medical equipment to be sent out to Ukraine, here is their response to us:

Dear Holy Trinity Church,

When war erupted in Ukraine on February 24, 2022, the world watched in shock and disbelief. Almost immediately, Samaritan's Purse began planning how we could help, praying for direction and open doors through which we could deliver practical help, in Jesus' Name.

In the past year, we have been able to provide life-saving care and hope to nearly 11 million people in Ukraine. Your prayers and generous support have made this possible, and we thank you!

During the first stages of our response, we focused on medical care, deploying an Emergency Field Hospital and operating multiple outpatient clinics at strategic locations to aid families transiting through the country. We treated more than 23,000 patients and performed 258 surgeries, and later opened a second Emergency Field Hospital. Now, we continue bringing relief by providing food, clean water, hygiene kits, wood stoves, shelter materials, and other emergency relief supplies.

In the *Ukraine: One Year Later* impact report we hope you will be encouraged by reading these first-hand accounts of how God is working through Samaritan's Purse. We appreciate your continued prayers for victims of the conflict and for our teams serving on the ground in Ukraine. THE GIANT'S GARDEN

A project update about the Young Adult Pioneers, Andrew and Elizabeth

What is a Pioneer? It is a trendy term – and much used in the secular world as well as thechurch. In Christian ministry, Pioneers work to reach those who are unlikely to experience the love and grace of Jesus by joining an existing congregation worshipping in a church building. As well as reaching those beyond the church community, they will often work with those they are reaching to support them to form new ways of worship or exploring discipleship which reflect their interests and priorities. This would be in partnership with local churches. So, for example, you may have heard of 'Messy Church,' which works to engage families who may struggle with the quiet and controlled atmosphere of much church-based worship; or 'Forest Church,' which aims to reach those who love the outdoors.

In Frome and the area around, very few if any young adults regularly worship in existing churches – of any denomination. The Diocese of Bath and Wells employs Andrew and Elizabeth Alden as a job share to engage with young adults – 16-25 years old – to befriend them, to invite them to explore the way of Jesus and then to build some form of worshipping community. They are coming up to the halfway point of a five-year post. At this stage the Young Adult Pioneers have a number of regular projects which enable them to meet young adults.

These include weekly lunches with young adults at the YMCA, a monthly

book club set-up in conjunction with Hunting Raven Bookshop in Frome, popup events with the HOPE team once or twice a month – but weekly in the summer – in one of the parks in Frome, a garden project called The Giant's Garden which offers growing space for young adults, a monthly open home, they offer chaplaincy at the Army Cadet Force and one-to-one discipleship and mentoring. Some of the young adults are now



exploring discipleship and Andrew and Elizabeth hope that by the end of 2023 there will be a discipleship group meeting regularly to explore the way of Jesus.

Ministry to young adults is costly. We hope that the Deanery will be encouraged to know that some of the cost of this is paid



for from those outside of the Deanery. For example, the YMCA lunch is paid for by a praying friend who knows Andrew and Elizabeth from before Frome, who himself was at one stage in the care system; £500 was given by an individual to buy fruit trees and bulbs for the Garden and money for the wall repair and raised beds there came from Andrew's former church; and



the pop-up parks ministry has seen over £400 given by individuals. However, there is still some way to go before a community of young adults in the area can be self-supporting – if indeed this is ever possible. Andrew and Elizabeth are deeply grateful to the Deanery for their gifts and events like the Barn Dance (see Page 26) which will raise money to enable more young adults to hear the good news of

Jesus. Donations for the raffle and auction of promises at the Barn Dance would be much appreciated.

Dear friends,

Thank you so much for your interest and support and for this opportunity to fill you in on what God is doing in our locality. Things are moving, almost too fast to keep up! A year ago we were basically about 20 people meeting together for worship, prayer etc. of which 15 were four generations of the same family, but recently there's been an increase in people of all ages joining us on a Sunday and a number who have decided to become involved and have joined our association "Espoir Hauts de France". Chris and I now oversee a flourishing housegroup made up of people new to faith plus a Christian couple who have joined us after moving to a neighbouring village. It is so encouraging to see people grow and share what they are receiving from God with each other.

We continue to interact with the Catholic parish. In January we hosted an evening during the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity and in March hosted the Women's World Day of Prayer.

There are a significant number of families participating on a Sunday, in part as a result of having organised children's events open to all on various Saturdays through the year. The next one of these is on Jonah (see photo). The increase in the number of children coming with their families on a Sunday has meant that we are now a team of 6 people sharing responsibility for children's work. Good material is hard to come by, but we have found a fun series on the "ifs" and "buts" in the bible. Not all the families who come know the Lord, so it is very special that they entrust us with their children. Other people we are seeing more of are those whose initial contact was through the now regular women's get- together "Morning Connect", a low-key time of sharing held several Saturdays a year. As our numbers go up on Sundays, French laws to do with religious activities mean we need to create (or join) an "association cultuelle". This posed no problem until fairly recently, but now such an association can exist only at the discretion of the "prefet" and its finances are under strict control. In addition, they have to be

presented to the authorities annually in the same form as would a business company, including paying for the validation of the annual accounts by an external expert. It's a little bit out of our league so we're glad we have a God who is able!

For Chris and me personally, we continue with our normal activities:

- B&B and the holiday cottage here at the Château du Paradis. The number of visitors is not yet sufficient to cover costs, but we enjoy meeting people

and sharing our hope with them where possible. One regular visitor, a Christian businessman from Holland, has decided to pay more than we ask for his B&B.

- Our English speaking groups.
- Joining in with the team at the Château Blanc.
- Nature education. As I write we are in the middle of the amphibian migration in a nearby forest which has a road running through it. The association we belong to has put up a barrier to stop the animals from being squashed as they cross the road and we are saving hundreds of animals a day. This annual event is supported by local schools (see photo).
- Gardening for local people, for the Château Blanc and here.



encouragement, Norah and Chris - Renovating the Château du
Paradis. Chris has just finished improving the
corridor (see photo) that runs from our « grande
salle » to the main hallway which we hope to use
as a display area. It has been really encouraging to
have had the help of friends for parts of this and
for the cleaning up afterwards! However, Chris
does do a lot of this work on his own and we could
do with more help. The next project is putting some
fencing on one side of the house.

2023 APCM

(Annual Parochial Church meeting) Wednesday May 3rd



This when reports of parish activities and finances are reviewed as well as new PCC (Parochial Church Council) members, Deanery Synod representatives and Churchwardens are elected.

Nominations are being invited for **SEVEN PCC representatives**, from people who are on the electoral roll. PCC Members represent the wider church family at PCC meetings, which take places roughly every 2 months. Agreement of the person you are nominating is required and signature of two people already on the electoral roll supporting the nomination.

Nominations are also being invited for **THREE Deanery Synod representatives**, who must also be on the PCC, meeting three times a year to represent Trinity at Deanery level and bring back Deanery news and initiatives to Trinity.

JOINING THE ELECTORAL ROLL

If you attend Holy Trinity (or live in the Parish) but have not completed an application to be on the Electoral Roll, please pick up a form from the back of the church. It is a requirement to be on the Electoral Roll to be able to vote at the annual APCM, stand for PCC etc.

PLEASE NOTE 11TH APRIL IS THE CUT OFF DATE FOR JOINING THE ELECTORAL ROLL FOR THE 2023 APCM

The Electoral forms are NOT the same as the GDPR Data Privacy forms that we are asking everyone to complete.



Water they paved a way.


These feet, they look so tired and worn,



GOOD NEWS FOR EVERYONE (formerly The Gideons)

Thank you for your continued support for Good News for Everyone! We visit schools on a regular basis: you may recall a time when you received a little red "Gideons Bible" as a pupil at school! This is a significant moment for many young people. We have stories of people whose lives have been shaped by their Gideons Bible.. sometimes after many years of storing it away! Last month we visited the Blue School in Wells and distributed over 200 bibles following a morning assembly. Over the coming weeks we have visits planned to local schools including Oakfield and Selwood (and we always take some Ukrainian bibles). Let me know if you would like to arrange a visit to any other schools.

Just before Christmas we distributed 100 New testaments and other literature to people attending the Frome Extravaganza. Alongside our work in schools we have opportunities for conversations and offering Bibles to hotels, prisons and nursing homes as well as places of work such as the livestock market at Standerwick. We also have links with "Canal Ministries" providing New Testaments along with food boxes to people living on our neighbouring waterways: many of whom are in need of support and encouragement.

It is always encouraging to hear what God is doing through neighbouring churches. One church hosts an "Open House" programme aiming to provide a shower and meals for those who have fallen on hard times... and bibles are available for them. Another local initiative uses the 'Good News For Everyone' bibles in door to door ministry. There are reports of great discussions: we hope peoples lives are eternally changed by the Word of God through this literature.

Please pray for some forthcoming opportunities:

- Supply of 200-300 Ukrainian New Testaments to troops currently training in the UK
- Chaplaincy opportunities at both the livestock market and local prison
- Opportunities for outreach at Hinckley Point C construction site (the largest construction site in Western Europe with > 8000 employees)
- Agricultural Shows across the South West including the New Forest Show,
 Devon County Show and Frome Cheese Show

• Reopening of doors in local schools (closed following the pandemic) In July I am joining Scripture Distribution at the Island Games on Guernsey. Outreach at the Tall Ships Event in Falmouth is planned during August. Please join us in praying for God's blessing on the opportunities available to us... and for more resource to reach even more people!

TIE A KNOT IN A PRAYER QUILT

You have hopefully seen the quilts that are sometimes displayed at the back of church. The Holy Trinity group of the Prayer Quilt Ministry (Chapter 1165) have made and given 88 quilts since 2014, which have gone all over the country, as well as some overseas. They can be made for anyone in special need of prayer.



However it is not about the quilt but about the prayers that are tied into it. Anyone can tie a knot (even children) so the next time you see a quilt displayed at the back of the church please do stop to tie and knot and say a prayer.

Most people say the quilts they receive are a huge comfort to them and cannot believe that people who don't know them will pray for them. They are a very real way of showing God's love to people in need. The rules of a quilt offering are it cannot be a surprise and it cannot be purchased (though donations towards the cost of making the quilts are appreciated). 

FROM THE OFFICE



<u>Stamps</u>: We collect all used postage stamps; international stamps from other countries are especially appreciated. Tear off just the stamp, leaving about 1cm of paper around the stamp. Place them in the pink box at the back of the church. PLEASE REMOVE ANY PLASTIC BAGS.

<u>Used inkjet printer cartridges</u>: We can recycle the following brands only - Canon, Dell, HP, Lexmark, Neopost and Samsung. Only the cartridge is needed, none of the other packaging.

<u>FOIL lined packets</u>: We collect these as well as sweet and chocolate wrappers, and CLEAN FOIL LINED food packets (such as pasta or rice bags for recycling. All recycling needs to be clean and dry. PLEASE—NO BAGS THAT HAVE HAD WET FOOD IN THEM and no ordinary non-foiled lined bags.

<u>Writing instruments</u>: Any brand of pen, felt tip, highlighter, marker, correction fluid pot, correction tape, mechanical pencil and eraser pen regardless of their composition. Please note **no glue sticks**, wooden pencils, chalk, glue sticks, erasers, rulers or other cutting objects that could disturb the recycling process.




