#### Why Easter matters

Hot cross buns and Easter eggs. To many these are what matter about Easter, along with a couple of extra days holiday. In our increasingly post-Christian (and seemingly post lots of things) world, it's so easy to miss the true meaning of Easter, and why it matters so much.

Easter is the heart of the Christian faith. Without Easter, Christianity simply makes no sense! And unsurprisingly, it's all about Jesus.

Christianity has a number of distinctives when compared to other faiths. For starters Christians, unlike other religions, believe that we don't have to earn our Heavenly Father's favour. In fact there's nothing we can do to gain salvation - we're saved by grace. In addition, we don't have to try and find God. He came to our rescue, coming in human form as Jesus through an amazing, miraculous virgin birth - another unique attribute.

But the greatest differentiator is that Christians believe in a *risen from the dead, back to life* Saviour. The Good Friday crucifixion led to an amazing Easter Sunday resurrection, just as Jesus himself and those Old Testament prophets had predicted. Now he lives and reigns eternally, and one day will come back again for those who believe in him.

Good Friday had to happen. Jesus' humiliating, and of course torturous, excruciating death on a cross, following his betrayal by one of his own and conviction by a kangaroo court, left him abandoned to die in the most shameful and painful way. It had to happen for him to carry the sins of the whole world, for him to become the ultimate sacrifice.

It was always God's plan that Jesus, his own son, would become the ultimate sacrificial lamb. It was something that only a perfect God could do. The Son of God died so that anyone who chose to follow him could now know God for themselves and be forgiven.

At the time, Good Friday looked like a disaster. It looked like the end, the ultimate failure. Death is final, or so everyone thought. But Jesus had been telling his followers what would happen next.

That first Easter Sunday is the greatest day in history. If Jesus' death was the ultimate sacrifice, then his resurrection is the ultimate victory. In rising again, Jesus wasn't just restored to life, miraculous in itself that it is. In doing so, he defeated death and the powers of evil that just days earlier, seeing him die, were congratulating themselves for defeating God.



#### **INTERCESSIONS for CHURCH WORSHIP**

These thoughts about leading intercessions are taken from a variety of Christian sources.

The task facing thousands of people all over the country every Sunday is how to produce intercessions that are topical, comprehensive, relevant and hopefully, helpful to their congregations, enabling them to approach God in their own way and their own time to pray for others.



Bringing intercessions during a church service is about standing in God's presence before the congregation, and on behalf of the congregation seeking God's will for the nations and peoples of the world, for the worldwide church, for our own nation, our own community, our church and for the church family. For those who are sick or suffering in mind, body or spirit, for the lonely and the grieving.

There are many resources that we can access to build our understanding of what prayer for others is, how to present them and, most importantly, how to be present to that small voice of the Holy Spirit as we lead the intercessions.

The first and foremost resource is, of course, the Bible. There are many examples of intercessory prayer in both the Old and New Testaments. In the Old Testament we have Solomon's prayer of dedication in 1 Kings 8, 22-53. In the New Testament Jesus offered up intercessory prayer, most notably in John 14. Paul also offered up intercessory prayers for the believers in Colossians 1,9-14. While he gives instruction to Timothy on the importance of intercessory prayer in 1 Timothy 2, 1-2.

In a Handbook of Intercessions by John Pritchard, at the beginning, there are some practicalities that it would be helpful to consider as we come to our preparations for the ministry of Intercessory Prayer.

- 1] Find out if there is anything special about this service. Is there a main theme? Is it a special service, ie: a baptism, a special event or festival?
- **2]** Know what might be on people's minds. Recent local/national or international events that might be in the current media output.
- **3]** Pray about the real world, not a narrowly religious one. Connect with what the congregation might be experiencing during the week.
- **4]** Be particular. Use examples from life, media etc. Paint word pictures, use images. Avoid generalizations, repetition or lists.
- **5]** Use vivid language. Rich & memorable language without being sentimental or 'flowery'. Good, imaginative language can lift people's spirits in prayer, sometimes
- this can help them to connect with the Spirit.
- **6]** Have a clear structure. Order and familiarity can help. Use of short responses is great because it gives the people a chance to be involved, using short phrases enables remembrance.
- Sometimes two people could be involved, two different voices is often a help for focus and concentration on the prayers.
- **7]** Address 'biddings' to the people, prayers to God. These are often confused. For example: Bidding --- 'We remember the dramatic scenes on the television last night -
- --' Prayer --- 'Father, we pray for ---'.
- **8]** Don't just read your notes. You are leading the people in prayer, so try to pray as well as follow your notes!
- **9]** Use silence and take risks. Many people are longing for a bit more space and stillness in our prayer/worship times.
- **10]** Use variety. God is infinitely rich and colourful and our prayers should reflect that depth and diversity.
- 11] Look for training and feedback. Ask for it if it isn't forthcoming.

An example of an opening prayer. (Taken from gatherings at New Wine.) 'Eternal God, fling open the doors of our hearts to the weather of Your Spirit; Lead us out beneath the dancing sky and wind, across the stumbling ground of our reality to where the sound of worship never ceases, and the view stretches further than the human eye can see. Through Christ the faithful witness, our Saviour and our Lord.'

I hope this short article will be of help to all of us who have the privilege of offering this ministry of intercessory prayer in our church services.

#### REFLECTIONS FOR LENT-ANN PHILLIPS

I know that by the time this magazine is 'out and about' Lent for this year will be over and we will have journeyed through the terrors of Good Friday and come into Trinity to rejoice on Easter Sunday, remembering our Lord's resurrection with joy, and possibly relief, for here is the crux and the foundation of our salvation. However, just for a few moments I would like to share my reflections on my Lenten journey, in the hope that it may be something some may consider for next lent (or even maybe before that!)

I have found Nick Fawcett's booklet entitled 'Stop and Stare. A Reflective Lent Course' both enlightening, instructive & indeed, reflective. Not by any means an up-to-date publication as it was published in 2007 But it still holds much that is enabling and helpful for a Lenten journey. all based on the poem 'Leisure' by W.H. Davies (1871-1940) In the introduction Nick Fawcett asks "Why has this poem struck such a chord?" as it has captured the hearts of generations of readers. Such a simple few words yet with such profound meaning in their depths. Perhaps because in the frenetic rush, busy -ness and demands of daily life we have pushed away, denied or forgotten the ability to stop and stare; to stop and wonder at the beauties and glory of daily life which even in our busy-ness surrounds us.

As Nick points out the thrust of the poem is the natural world but for Christians it also reminds us to reflect on the things of God, allowing the ordinary to become special, the secular sacred, the

common place touched by the divine. It contains scripture, prayers, proverbs and sayings, reflections, opportunities for discussion if used in groups, periods for silence, music, hymns and poetry. A good mix, I think, for a Lenten journey. What do you think?

I would be interested in any feedback. Apart from following these lovely pages through the long, wet weeks of February, I have found the early Spring flowers & shrubs in my front garden, up-lifting. The colour and beauty of white Magnolia Stellata flowers just beginning to bloom, the bright gold of the Tete a Tete daffodils against the deep purple of crocus flowers, the green buds springing out of dark, cold earth. How good is our God in giving us so much HE RE ---- despite the destruction & misery of the others --- THERE (whereever you are praying & weeping over events in our world.) FINALLY: A Prayer (anon; 3<sup>rd</sup> -6<sup>th</sup> century, AD)

May none of God's wonderful works keep silence, night or morning.

Bright stars, high mountains, depths of the seas, source of rushing rivers; may all these break into song as we sing to

may all these break into song as we sing to the Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

May all the angels in the heavens reply; Amen, Amen, Amen.

Power, praise, honour, eternal glory to God, the only giver of grace.

Amen, Amen, Amen.

An image which has helped us in our work at the cafe is to see ourselves as the fragrance of Christ, as we interact with our lovely Bridge family. We create a warm and attractive space, provide them with nourishing and affordable food, listen to them, laugh and cry with them and give practical support, as and when we can.

As we do so, in the name of Christ, we trust that they will sense something special, an aroma which is warm and attractive and which interests and draws them, even though they don't know what the fragrance is.

At the fortnightly Teas we give that fragrance a name, the name of Jesus, and through story and testimony we encourage people to put their trust in Him. The work of The Bridge is gentle and unassuming, but we know God is at work, blessing us and opening doors of opportunity.

New people have come in this last year, both as customers and volunteers and, most significantly, as Friends of the Bridge Cafe. These are Christians who will come in as customers and interact with people, in a very real sense being the eyes and ears of those who serve behind the counter and alerting us to people's need.

Footfall and income have both increased recently, making the cafe a viable and financially independent small business. More volunteers would help us expand and be open for more hours, so please keep your hearts open to God's promptings!


# MISSIONS - MIKE AND BRIGIT ADAMS FIRST RESPONSE RADIO

We had a full house at Christmas, with Colleen and Ben, Eden (4yrs) and Maddy (8 mo), plus Megan and boyfriend Jake here. We were very pleased when Megan and Jake got engaged after Christmas. They are planning a small wedding party in Washington State I 2025. Megan and Jake bought a house just before Christmas, and Ben and Colleen also moved into a new home just after Christmas; both have requested our help getting electrical and fix-it jobs done in their respective homes!

Brigit officially stopped volunteering in our church office at the beginning of the year, and started her next role as 'Interim Operations Manager' but that has taken a back seat seat for a while as she is still recovering from surgery in March.

#### **PHILIPPINES TRIP**

Last November Mike travelled to the Philippines, stopping off in Cambodia on the way to do a workshop with the FEBC Engineering staff. As well has building on nearly 25 years of relationship and mentoring with the FEBC Cambodia staff, Mike engaged with the NPIC telecoms



dept with whom he developed a relationship while we were living in Cambodia.

Mike went on to Tacloban in the Philippines to join the FRR team there in commemorating 10 years since the 2013 Typhoon Haiyan disaster response. As Mike walked around Tacloban, the epicenter of the disaster, he and his FRR teammate Maggie Y. had much to reflect on. It was great to see the town has rebuilt and recovered well, but at the same time there were mixed emotions as even 10 years later the feelings of fear, darkness and pain are still there.

As well as attending the event celebrating the anniversary of FEBC Philippines Christian community radio station that was built in Tacloban after Haiyan,



Mike met the new FEBC Philippines Director, saw the suitcase radio developments by FEBC Philippines, learned about their recent training events, and connected with many friends at FEBC and in Manila. He also visited the UN IOM offices in downtown Manila, who had bought a suitcase radio set previously and want to start connecting again.

**GOOD NEWS!** For many years now Mike has been asking you to pray for the right replacement to take over from him before he retires in 2+ years. FEBC Philippines has stepped up to take on the responsibility for running the FRR project on behalf of all FEBC teams and will engage with team leaders in other countries as well. Maggie said "Mike, no one else in FEBC is as passionate as I am about FRR; you can know your baby is safe with me!"

In his final years before retirement Mike has offered to serve the FRR team at FEBC Philippines and hand things over as he slowly transitions out of his role coordinating FRR on behalf of all FEBC. We are still waiting for FEBC PH to confirm what this transition will look like. We are NOT retiring now though. Mike is still working as a missionary for FEBC USA and we do not anticipate retiring until Mike is 67 (about 2 years from now).

#### FRR BACKPACK STUDIO/RADIO

On Mike's trip to the Philippines, FRR team leader, Maggie Y. said she would like to have a studio in a hand-carry sized case. She explained that sometimes equipment checked as luggage does not get on board the plane and can be delayed or left behind (this happened to the FRR Indonesia team responding to the Palu earthquake). While they also need the FM transmitter and antenna, if they at least had their studio they could begin producing radio programs. Mike realised that even a mini-FM transmitter can be put into a small suitcase, and his most recent development has been to build an entire FM radio station that fits inside a backpack! It's a bit small to see but the kit includes 2 sets of headphones, phone and

field recording mics, a mixing desk, laptop, a mini-transmitter and antenna and a backpack.



Since 2012, as part of Mikes missionary role with FEBC, he has provided equipment to organizations inside and outside of FEBC. There was an obvious need as no one else created suitcase radio sets like the ones FEBC made for their own teams. This has always been done with the priority of serving FEBC teams first, and then others as time allowed. Over the years we have helped provide equipment and training to the BBC, Internews, UN IOM (Philippines), World Vision, UNFPA, Deutche Welle Academy (German Nat'l Broadcaster) and provided advice and support to many other organisations. Mike's dream is to make this equipment and his expertise available to every organization who can use it to bring humanitarian information to areas of need.

#### GOOD NEWS FOR EVERYONE (FORMER GIDEONS)

Thank you so much for your ongoing support and prayers for GNFE! Having just celebrated Christmas and the New Year we have so much to thank God... for the gift of His precious Son...and the open door of opportunity to spread the Good News in our homes and communities! Whilst some of the traditional routes for outreach have been curtailed in recent years, others are emerging! These include large scale events such as recent distributions to Scouts and Guides at Exeter Cathedral and sports organizations such as Bristol City and Rugby Bears.

Over the past year there has been much blessing at recent summer festivals and agricultural shows! The following provides a brief snapshot:

- Opportunity to distribute 100s of New Testaments and tracts at both the Frome Cheese Show and the Bath and West Dairy Show. Overall people happy to engage in conversation... especially students/young people and families
- Circulating around 500 scriptures to the asylum seeker barge in Portland Harbour... following this a neighbouring church has commenced regular bible studies for a group from Iran The Falmouth Tall Ships event last August provided opportunity to distribute 1400 "Tall Ships" badged New Testaments along with 5000 tracts to the ships crews and hundreds of visitors from all over the world!
- August also saw the annual GNFE Bath Abbey outreach. 1000 English and 185 foreign languages New Testaments were distributed.
- A unique opportunity in collaboration with the local church to distribute 1000 New Testaments to new housing estates in a neighbouring town.
- The carol service at Frome Market was well attended. There was a clear presentation of the Christmas message alongside distribution of New Testaments
- A recent Christmas initiative at the annual Frome extravaganza involved distributing bibles and hot chocolate to children and families in the annual Christmas light switch-on!

<u>Stamps</u>: We collect all used postage stamps; international stamps from other countries are especially appreciated. Tear off just the stamp, leaving about 1cm of paper around the stamp. Place them in the **pink box at the back of the church.** PLEASE REMOVE ANY PLASTIC BAGS.

<u>Used inkjet printer cartridges</u>: We can recycle the following brands only - Canon, Dell, HP, Lexmark, Neopost and Samsung. Only the cartridge is needed, none of the other packaging.

<u>FOIL lined packets</u>: Crisp packets, sweet and chocolate wrappers, and CLEAN FOIL LINED food packets (such as pasta or rice bags for recycling. All recycling needs to be clean and dry. PLEASE—NO BAGS THAT HAVE HAD WET FOOD IN THEM and no ordinary non-foil lined bags.

<u>Writing instruments</u>: Any brand of pen, felt tip, highlighter, marker, correction fluid pot, correction tape, mechanical pencil and eraser pen regardless of their composition. Please note **no glue sticks**, wooden pencils, chalk, wax crayons, erasers, rulers or other cutting objects that could disturb the recycling process.


