# THE LOST MESSAGE OF ADVENT

It's happened again this year. As soon as we reached the start of November, the media in all its forms started exploding with advertisements for all things Christmas. From Asda to Waitrose, selling baubles to Yule logs, we're now into the season of good (or maybe not) marketing. And how many of us waited with baited breath for this year's John Lewis Christmas advert?

Now before everyone thinks I'm going all bah humbug, this article is not going to be a moan about the seemingly earlier onset of Christmas each year. But there is a point to be made – something that's so easily missed in our December busyness. In all the hustle and bustle of shopping, planning, cooking, wrapping and partying, in all the noise and clutter from the run up to Christmas, we have lost sight of something important - Advent.

To many, it seems Advent has simply come to mean calendars with little chocolates behind cardboard doors. But Advent is about so much more. It is for good reason that Advent is the season that marks the start of a New Year in the life of the Church. Advent is about preparation. It's about the patient, watchful waiting in hope and expectation. It's about pausing and quietly reflecting about what is to come.

Firstly, it's the time for us all to prepare for the enormity of what happened that first Christmas day when Jesus the Messiah was born in Bethlehem. Advent gives us a chance to take stock, to take time to worship the God who always planned to send his son Jesus to this earth.

Indeed, many of the traditional Advent readings that speak about Jesus are from the Old Testament of the Bible. Remarkably, they foretell Jesus' birth, life, death and resurrection. They speak of God's incredible plan for the world. These are words that sustained centuries of believers in the hope that God would send his Son to restore humanity to a relationship with himself. What a privilege to live in a time where we can know this Jesus for ourselves!

However, there's a second waiting at the heart of Advent. The Latin 'adventus' is translated from the Greek word 'parousia'. This is commonly used to refer to the Second Coming of Christ. So as well as allowing us to share in the ancient longing for the coming of the Messiah, Advent alerts us to the truth that Jesus will return to earth, this time as Lord of lords.

Of course, none of us know when Jesus will return. The early Church expected him imminently. 2,000 years later we're still waiting. Maybe that's why the idea can so often seem unreal and perhaps it explains why it's easy for us to be complacent. However, doing so lulls us into a false sense of security.

We read in Acts chapter 1 that as Jesus ascended into heaven, the angels said that he would come back in the same way that he had gone. But are we ready to meet him? What will it be like? In the parable of the sheep and goats (Matthew 35 v31- 46), Jesus tells us that the Son of Man will come back to judge and to reward each of us according to how we treat others. I don't know about you, but I find this a challenging thought!

As we face a season bombarded by a barrage of adverts convincing us that we need the latest product to be fulfilled in life, or by shopping at a certain retailer we will feel more 'Christmassy', Advent encourages us to stop and reflect. There is hope in Advent. There is hope in Jesus. The call of Advent is one of pause, waiting, hoping.

There's so much truth in the old adage that it's better to give than receive. Perhaps at this time of giving to those who will return our gifts, we should also consider helping those who are hungry, thirsty, strangers, sick or in prison. We can bring hope to others – hope that ultimately comes from Jesus, both by his coming as a baby in Bethlehem and the promise of his return as Lord of lords.

My challenge to us all this Advent is to carve out times of reflection in the midst of the chaos of the preparation for Christmas. Time to reflect on what we are celebrating. Time to pause in expectation and hope. Time to read the advent scriptures and to pray that God might inspire you afresh. And time to consider our own response to the Jesus who tells us that how we treat others really matters.

May I wish you a blessed Advent and peaceful and wonderful Christmas. Ian

# INTRODUCING SAM THOMPSON

Hello everyone, I'm Sam and currently I am in my final year of ordination training at Ridley Hall in Cambridge and I'm delighted to be joining you as Curate at Holy Trinity Frome next July.

I grew up in Basingstoke in a Christian family, and we were a part of Basingstoke Community Churches (BCC), a group of non-denominational evangelical churches in and around Basingstoke who were part of the Salt and Light network of churches. I had a faith



and became a Christian when I was a child. I aim to have a calm, easy-going character with a good sense of humour, and a tendency to tell bad jokes!

I have a keen interest in planes, cars, and all things engineering and I spent 4 years in the RAF Air Cadets when I was a teenager. I left home at 18 and moved to start a degree apprenticeship at Airbus in Filton, Bristol. There I completed an Aerospace Engineering degree at UWE whilst working for Airbus and once I finished the apprenticeship I started working as a Fuel Systems Engineer; focusing on integrating Sustainable Aviation Fuel for use on Airbus aircraft. During this time I was living in Portishead, and became part of Christchurch in Clevedon, an Anglican-Methodist Local Ecumenical Partnership (LEP).

I was becoming more involved in the life of the church in Clevedon, and my faith was really starting to deepen. During the first COVID lockdown, I found myself on furlough for 3 months, and started to feel a call to church ministry. This sense of calling became stronger after a lot of prayer and once I started having conversations with my vicar and the diocesan vocations team; it then became clear God was calling me full time to ordained ministry. The following year I went through the discernment process and started training at Ridley Hall.

I'm looking forward to making Frome my home and joining Holy Trinity in its vision to know Christ and make him known.

### FROME FESTIVAL-ACTION NEEDED NOW!

2. Liaise, delegate, contact speakers/performers etc. until info is ready to submit to Festival.

3. May onwards - organise or delegate publicity, posters etc.

4. Early June – start to recruit stewards for events (or delegate this to someone)

5. Beginning of July – final arrangements

Just as an encouragement, this year there were approx. 500 attendances at Trinity promoted events (as well as many at other events), and there was a net profit of over £1300 for Trinity, including bar takings (+ Church/Hall hire income from other events).

Every day, as the countdown to Christmas continues, you can explore ways to reflect on and appreciate God's creation and share simple actions to take care of it better. Through Eco Advent, each day leading up to Christmas can be meaningful, both spiritually and environmentally. Ruth Slade, Growing Faith and Everyday Faith Adviser says, "More and more people are aware of the environmental impact of Christmas and as Christians, of course, we are committed to caring for creation.

Bath and Wells Diocese are offering a fun resource to both celebrate our journey to Christmas and at the same time reflect on our duty to care for this beautiful world that God has

gifted us.

"As well as offering daily Bible verses, prayers and reflections, everyone can join us in the Advent journey by first setting up a starry spiral path to a manger, and follow the daily tasks we are sharing on our website and social media channels. In true ecofashion, there's no need to buy any special resources, just use what you have to hand to craft what you need to create your starry spiral and manger.

### What you need

- Stars: You can craft stars using clay, cardboard, or even draw them on paper or use starshaped stickers.
- Tea light (real or LED): we would like you to light this each day when adding to your spiral. Make sure it is in a safe place.
- Stable or Hut: Create your own using sticks, paper, or whatever you find handy.
- Figures: Collect figurines to represent Mary, Joseph, Jesus and yourself. Use toys like Lego or Playmobil, or craft them from clay or plasticine.

(There will be further instructions for things you will need to collect each day).



### A UNIQUE STORY

When I speak to my Mum on my birthday, she often recalls to me the events that surrounded my arrival in the world. These include nearly being born in the hospital lift, my older brother being smuggled in to see me under my dad's overcoat and of various aunts sneaking onto the maternity ward out of visiting hours by wearing their WRVS uniforms.

Each of us has a unique story about our birth. At Christmas we'll be recounting once again the story that we share about another birth - the birth of Jesus. Across the world we'll be re-telling and re-enacting what happened in Bethlehem more than 2000 years ago. We'll recall the journey of Mary and Joseph, the birth in the stable, the arrival of the shepherds, the song of the angels, the visit of the Magi.

Our own birth stories are unique to each of us. Jesus' is common to us all. And not just because we all know about it. For in our recollection of Jesus' birth, we'll also be remembering that in him, God came to be at one with us. In Jesus God arrived to share fully in our humanity, experiencing complete solidarity with every aspect of our human condition. Jesus is 'God with us' – in trenches in Ukraine, bomb shelters in Israel and Gaza, in hospital wards where loved ones die, in relationships where there is conflict and distress.

Just as much as he is with us in our greatest joys and our deepest woes, Jesus is also for us. One of the earliest teachers of the Church said this: 'He became what we are so that we might become what he is.' The baby born in Bethlehem stands with us not only in all that we experience, this child also comes to offer us the possibility of opening every part of our lives to the transforming power of God's life of love and joy and peace. He comes so that every day we can become a little more like him.

This is the good news of Christmas and may it be yours this year. A very Merry Christmas to you all.

- Hunting Raven Books and Roots Café, enabling 1625bookclub to bless a small number of young adults.
- The police and council, who welcome the 1625parkspopup team, with members from various churches. This team, which grew out of HOPE, visits Victoria and Mary Bailey parks regularly on Saturday evenings with food and or drink to share with young people. At Easter, some young people accepted our offer of a prayer of blessing, after which one young lad gathered his friends around to receive the same.

# FROM THE OFFICE

<u>Stamps</u>: We collect all used postage stamps; international stamps from



other countries are especially appreciated. Tear off just the stamp, leaving about 1cm of paper around the stamp. Place them in the **pink box at the back of the church.** PLEASE REMOVE ANY PLASTIC BAGS.

<u>Used inkjet printer cartridges</u>: We can recycle the following brands only -Canon, Dell, HP, Lexmark, Neopost and Samsung. Only the cartridge is needed, none of the other packaging.

**FOIL lined packets**: Crisp packets, sweet and chocolate wrappers, and CLEAN FOIL LINED food packets (such as pasta or rice bags for recycling. All recycling needs to be clean and dry. PLEASE—NO BAGS THAT HAVE HAD WET FOOD IN THEM and no ordinary non-foil lined bags.

<u>Writing instruments</u>: Any brand of pen, felt tip, highlighter, marker, correction fluid pot, correction tape, mechanical pencil and eraser pen regardless of their composition. Please note **no glue sticks**, wooden pencils, chalk, erasers, rulers or other cutting objects that could disturb the recycling process.
