

DISCIPLESHIP - GENERATIONS

One of the most extraordinary counter culture events in the early Christian communities was the regular agape meals. The believers would gather for a pot luck shared meal and celebration of communion or the Lord's Supper.

Jews would eat with Gentiles, slaves would eat with their masters, men would eat with women. It cut across all the cultural norms of the time. Paul writes in Galatians $3 \vee 26 - 28$ "In Jesus you are all children of God through faith, for you were all baptised into Christ. There is neither Jew or Gentile (racial division), slave or free (class division), male or female (gender division), for you are all one in Christ Jesus.

There is one division that he did not mention that is a major issue in our culture and in the churches – the generational divide between old and young. Our culture has changed so quickly over recent decades that the way different generations think, act and communicate are profound.

When I left school, I studied Mechanical Engineering and worked for a while in a drawing office designing conveying systems. I spent all day with a slide rule working out the stresses in a beam – there were no computers to do it for us in seconds. I got so bored that I left and went into Antique Furniture Restoration. I don't think I could use a slide rule now!

In the church family, we have a unique opportunity to challenge this cultural fracture. We can deliberately reach over the barriers that would divide us from one another. After Helen died, some of the younger families took me on and invited me for meals and walks and it has been a huge blessing for me. There is so much mutual enrichment as we move beyond our own micro – tribe and see the world through the eyes of others.

It would be great if we could actively seek out spiritual parents and spiritual children so we are a really inter-generational family. It would be great if the community groups could actively draw in those from all ages. It would be great if each group could take responsibility to care for, shop for, pray for those in our community who can no longer get to our church gatherings. This is the family of God – let's make it a caring, sharing, happy family!

PARISH NURSE NEWS

Isaiah 9:6 NIV

For unto us a child is born, unto us a son is given; and the government shall be upon his shoulder: and his name shall be called Wonderful, Counsellor, Mighty God.

Dear Trinity family,

I hope you are all keeping well as we head towards Christmas, a period of great hope and joy within our church and the general Christian community worldwide. Wishing you all a joyous and blessed Christmas, and a happy and healthy 2022!

It's November as I write this article, and I'm aware of World Antimicrobial Awareness Week (WAAW) which is led globally by the World Health Organization (WHO). It aims to increase awareness of global antimicrobial resistance (AMR) and to encourage best practices among the general public, health workers and policy makers to avoid the further emergence and spread of drugresistant infections.

As a nurse, it's something that interests me, and it should interest you and your families because:

Antibiotic resistance remains one of the biggest threats facing us today.

Why it is relevant to you?: without effective antibiotics many routine treatments will become increasingly dangerous. Setting broken bones, basic operations, even chemotherapy and animal health all rely on access to antibiotics that work.



What we want you to do: It is important to remember that antibiotics do not treat or prevent viruses, including the one that causes COVID19. To slow the increase in resistance, we need to cut unnecessary use of antibiotics. We invite the public, students and educators, farmers, the veterinary and medical communities, and professional organisations, to become Antibiotic Guardians.

So what does it mean exactly to become an Antibiotic Guardian?

Call to action: Choose one simple pledge about how you will make better use of antibiotics and help save these vital medicines from becoming obsolete. You can do this simply by visiting their website if you have internet access at https://antibioticguardian.com/

General Antibiotics are essential medicines for treating bacterial infections in both humans and animals. Antibiotics are losing their effectiveness at an increasing rate. leaders) can take action by choosing a pledge and becoming an Antibiotic Guardian: www.antibioticguardian.com

Bacteria can adapt and find ways to survive the effects of an antibiotic. They become 'antibiotic resistant' so that the antibiotic no longer works. The more you use an antibiotic, the more bacteria become resistant to it.

Antibiotics should be taken as prescribed, never saved for later or shared with others; it is important that we use antibiotics in the right way, the right drug, at the right dose, at the right time for the right duration.

Appropriate use of antibiotics will slow down the development of antibiotic resistance. There are very few new antibiotics in the development pipeline, which is why it is important we use our existing antibiotics wisely and make sure these life-saving medicines continue to stay effective for us, and our children and grandchildren.

Many antibiotics are prescribed and used for mild infections when they don't need to be. All colds and most coughs, sinusitis, otitis media (earache) and sore throats get better without antibiotics.

Community pharmacists are well placed to help provide advice on over-the-counter medicines to manage symptoms and help with self-care.

Keep Antibiotics Working raises awareness of antibiotic resistance amongst the general public and encourages greater trust in doctors' advice when it comes to whether to take antibiotics or not. Individuals (the public, healthcare professionals, educators and

Antibiotic resistance is a threat to your health.

Good hygiene is essential in reducing the risk of spread of infections and is especially important in households with individuals who have chronic illnesses.

Antibiotics do not work for ALL colds, or for most coughs, sore throats or earache. Your body can usually fight these infections on its own.

Taking antibiotics encourages harmful bacteria that live inside you to become resistant. That means that antibiotics may not work when you really need them. This puts you and your family at risk of a more severe or longer illness.

Take your doctor, pharmacist or nurse's advice when it comes to antibiotics.

Antibiotics are important medicines and should only be taken when prescribed by a health professional. When antibiotics are prescribed by a health professional it is important that you always take them as directed, never save them for later and never share them with others.

Antibiotics can have side effects as they upset the natural balance of bacteria potentially resulting in diarrhoea and/or thrush. The use of inappropriate antibiotics may also allow other more harmful bacteria to increase. Antibiotics also cause other side effects such as rashes, stomach pains and reactions to sunlight.

Antibiotic resistant bacteria don't only affect you; they can spread to other people (and animals) in close contact with you and are very difficult to treat.

How to look after yourself and your family:

If you or a family member are feeling unwell, have a cold or flu and you haven't been prescribed antibiotics, here are some effective self-care ways to help you feel better:

- ask your pharmacist to recommend medicines to help with symptoms or pain
- get plenty of rest make sure you or your child drink enough to avoid feeling thirsty.
- fever is a sign that the body is fighting infection and most fevers will get better on their own use paracetamol if you or your child are feeling uncomfortable
- make sure to use a tissue for your nose and wash your hands frequently to avoid spreading your infection to family and friends.

If you're worried, speak to a doctor who will be able to advise you on the best treatment for your symptoms.

FRIENDS OF MARSABIT NOV 2021



Here is the latest news from Marsabit:

Covid hasn't proved a major problem yet, except

economically, thank the Lord! But please pray more vaccinations may be available, including for Bishops and clergy!

Two critical issues for your prayers are drought and insecurity **Drought is biting hard**, and

thousands are starving. Famine relief has been distributed by the World Food Programme and the Government, and the Diocese has been given small relief grants for Bubisa and Karare, but there is no major relief programme

Please pray for rain – it will soon be 18 months without normal rains... and for famine relief.



Insecurity has been really bad. On November 4th, there was a ghastly attack close to Marsabit town on the way to Badassa. Gunmen sprayed a Canter van (taxi), killing 6 and injuring 11. It was thought to be Gabra killers, and the victims were mainly Borana. Relationships are extremely tense between these two communities, throughout the North. Consecration of the Badassa church has had to be delayed yet again due to this insecurity.

Please pray for the elders and peacemakers, that the endless cycle of violence may cease.

10th Anniversary Celebrations finally took place on November 7th. It was a wonderful day! Under a cloudless blue sky, huge processions of brightly dressed clergy, readers, choirs, and 15 people to be made Canons, moved slowly across the Diocesan compound past the Cathedral to a dozen shady gazebos. Bishop Qampicha presided and + Joseph from Machakos was the guest speaker and leader of the Canons' retreat. The new Canons were old colleagues of ours – so we found it very moving! Sue and I watched on Facebook Live, through Sammy Durito's Facebook page (Unclesam). It was hard to break away from it, 2 ½ hours later, when it was still in full swing, but I was leading and preaching elsewhere, in a very different BCP environment! What a joyful day.

The Harambee (fundraiser) at the end was toned down because of security and funds raised will now go towards St. Andrew's High School, our secondary school for boys. FoM had sent £21,000 to help buy 3 acres for a Girls' secondary School, but owing to the security situation, a suitable neutral plot is still being identified.

Please give thanks for all that's been achieved over the past 10 years, & pray for ongoing blessing

Two Microfinance projects are gathering pace. A webinar in October with 5 Talents gave feedback on one of them. It helps over 100 women and a few men with literacy and numeracy, gets them to save and then gives loans to enable them to start small business ventures. Headed by the Mothers Union, under Rev Elema, (MU Coordinator), they meet in churches, but are open to all.

Please pray for these projects, and pray that women may be more empowered in a male-led society

Professor Joseph Galgalo, originally from our desert area of Bubisa, and former Vice Chancellor of St. Paul's University, Limuru, has been appointed Provincial Secretary and been consecrated Suffragan Bishop of All Saints Cathedral Diocese, as Rob once was.

Please pray for him, as he takes up this demanding role.

Also in this letter, we wanted to account for how FoM has used your gifts in 2020.

In September, we submitted our independently examined 2020 accounts to the Charity Commissioners. **Here is the annual review we sent them:**

2020 was the seventh full year for the Friends of Marsabit. The trustees met three times, twice on zoom, and Bishop Qampicha joined us for our June zoom meeting. The database, enabling better communication with FoM supporters, is deemed to be consistent with the requirements of Data Protection Regulations.

During 2020, Kenya was on the red list of countries, so it was impossible for visits to happen between Kenya and UK. It also forced the postponement of the 2020 visit to Kenya by Marsabit supporters. But we kept in regular contact with Bishop Qampicha via FaceTime.

Particular challenges were Covid restrictions, locusts, lack of rain and insecurity. Trustee funds raised in 2020 were used to fund a number of development projects designed to improve the livelihoods of the peoples of Marsabit, and enable the Diocese to become more self-sufficient.

We transferred funds, not just to support the general running of the Diocese, but also made a special appeal to support Diocesan workers through the pandemic, as a sort of furlough scheme. This raised £44,840. We also provided support for buying

motorcycles, training of church workers, youth conferences and school fees; and to assist with the building of permanent churches across the Diocese. Our four newsletters have kept Friends informed of activities in Marsabit and aware of the challenges faced by the people in the area.

Financial review £85,560 was received during 2020 (£68,662 in 2019). We gave grants totalling £79,560. The Trust entered 2021 with £25,319 in the bank and accounts receivable of £982. We are slowly increasing the number of people giving by Standing Order.

Thank you, thank you, everyone so much for your continued prayers and support! It has helped the Diocese to flourish during 8 of the past 10 years! Please consider setting up a standing order?

What will the next 10 years bring?!

Please pray we all stay close to the Lord through it all



The Story of Active and In Touch Frome 2011-2021 A Community's Response to Loneliness

There are two books in the Bible, Esther and Song of Songs, which do not mention God but He is 'absent' in neither; both reveal God at work and His fingerprints are all over them. Both books serve to help us understand how God's 'Big Story' plays out around us.

Luther transformed our understanding of God's calling, insisting upon the dignity and value of all labour. He insisted the farmer shovelling manure and the maid milking the cow both please God as much as the minister preaching or praying, whether they know Him or not. Luther endeavoured to remove the split between sacred and secular work; it is a challenge which continues to confront society, the 'great divide'.

The narrative of A&IT's first decade is extraordinary in many ways. 'Birthed' in a Holy Trinity house group when Anna Brindle planted the 'mustard seed', the story reveals countless serendipitous moments and a number of truly existential challenges. By the grace of God, A&IT negotiated these challenges, each of which served to prepare the charity for the arrival of Covid-19 and its unimaginable consequences.

Honoured locally, regionally and nationally for its contribution in 2020-2021, the story illustrates the unexpected fruit which can emerge from following God's call. As 'Called by God', our community prayer diary, reminds us:

To refashion the fabric of this world until it resembles the shape of your Kingdom

Jesus now lead on.

THE BRIDGE CAFÉ

The Bridge continues to provide an invaluable service to our local community. It is a place where people can find company, friendship, affordable food (sometimes free) and practical help and advice. For one of our homeless friends, it is quite literally a place where he can come and warm up next to the radiator, after spending a night in the cold. Above all, it is a place where they can meet with Christ, as He lives and loves and serves through us, His heart, hands and feet in this broken world.

We have already noticed how some of our customers are struggling financially, in particular with the recent ending of the £20 a week Universal Credit top up and the increase in the cost of living, which is disproportionately affecting the poorest in our communities. We were so touched by the very generous response at Holy Trinity to our appeal for people to buy vouchers, which we can use at the café to pay for those meals and drinks we have to offer without cost, or at a heavily subsidised amount. More than £100 was given, and almost immediately we started having customers in who needed help paying for their meals. It was a timely and God inspired response, and we will be selling them again in the next few weeks.

We are a faith work, not just a business, and though we are maintaining viability and meeting our outgoings, we are having to always trust in The Lord for His provision. We have had a couple of challenging weeks financially recently, as the café needed to be closed on account of a Covid-related incident on top of an unexpected absence of two of our regular customers, but we have been amazed by the timeliness of two very generous gifts from well-wishers in the church.

If you feel drawn to support this work of mercy in any way, then please speak to us. There are some volunteering opportunities and we are always open to explore these with you, and to prayerfully discern together whether God is calling you to this ministry. It would be lovely to see any of you coming in for a drink and cake, or even a meal. We are including here a copy of our menu to see if it will tempt a few more church folk in.

Please pray for those of us who serve, especially that we might discern further ways in which we can share God's love with our Bridge community, as that has always been our vision and our heart's desire.





STAMPS: We collect ALL used postage stamps, international stamps from other countries are especially appreciated. Tear off just the stamp, leaving about 1cm of paper around the stamp. Place them in the pink box at the back of the church. When there is 1kg or more they are sent away, the company that buys them from Trinity pays for postage so this is a great little fundraiser at no cost to Trinity.

USED INKJET PRINTER CARTRIDGES for the following brands only: **Canon, Dell, Hp, Lexmark, Neopost and Samsung**. All others need to go to the recycling tip. Only the cartridge is needed, none of the other packaging.

WRITING INSTRUMENTS are accepted: Any brand of pen, felt tip, highlighter, marker, correction fluid pot, correction tape, mechanical pencil and eraser pen regardless of their composition.

Please Note: No wooden pencils, chalk, glue sticks, erasers, rulers or other cutting objects that could disturb the recycling process.

ARCHDEACONRY DAYS 2022

We are pleased to invite you to the **2022 Archdeaconry Days**, which will take place over the week of **6 - 12 February 2022**.

Last year, for the first time, we experimented with offering resources for people to access during the week and then coming together online in three Archdeaconry gatherings to celebrate and reflect. We were delighted that over 800 people signed up to receive the resources and that so many people contributed to the online Prayer Wall - it really did feel as though a wave of prayer was sweeping around the diocese and that lots of people were trying out ways of praying that were new to them.

We are going to be exploring people's experience of hearing and responding to God's call. We have noticed that sometimes people think God only calls 'special' people and wanted to encourage everyone to know that God calls each one of us every day in a whole range of ways, some humdrum and some huge but always to reflect God's love for us and the world.

The pattern will be:

- January 2022: The Calling Podcast
 Episodes of a podcast devised and hosted by young people in the diocese, talking to a range of people about their sense of calling.
- Sunday 6 February at 3pm: Worship
 Bishop Ruth will join us at Taunton Academy for worship on the theme of calling.
- Monday 7 Friday 11 February: Inspiration and experimentation

 A short video will be released each day, featuring people from across the diocese talking about their experience of calling in response to questions like 'What does it feel like to be called?' and 'Do any stories of calling in the Bible inspire you?'.

 We hope that people will also reflect on their own answers to these questions.
- Saturday 12 February: Discussion and reflection together
 Online sessions will give people the chance to hear more about calling, discuss their reflections and celebrate how God calls us in so many ways and places.

Each session will be hosted by an Archdeacon.

Trinity Church Eco Programme 2021-2022

'The earth is the Lord's, and everything in it, the world, and all who live in it

As we step into the New Year, it is encouraging to look back at the progress in 2021.

- The Bath and Wells Diocese have established a 5yr environmental policy. A key person in this is Caroline Pomeroy in Nunney and with close links to Holy Trinity.
- Significant steps taken to establish a biodiversity trail linking the churchyards in Frome.

 The vision is to develop this across the Deanery, building the body of Christ.
- Holy Trinity receiving the A Rocha silver award. Thank you, Maggie, for steering this. We need to live up to this and press on for a gold award in due course.
- The eco patch established and defined in the churchyard (bottom end, behind posts)
- The first steps to manage/mow the long grasses, sowing yellow rattle (the 'meadow maker') and establishing a flower meadow in the coming years.
- The planting of hedgerow species such as hawthorn, wild rose and blackthorn; the planting of trees, including wild cherry, crab apple and spindle. A number of long-established plants remain such as elderflower, blackberry and Buddleia

The sightings of slow worms and a range of butterflies

The provision of a 'bug hotel' and some bird boxes.

Plans for 2022

The inclusion of eco theology in the church's preaching and teaching programme for all ages, identifying 4 weeks, including Harvest Festival, as our 'Eco month'.

Provision of eco studies for fellowship groups and an eco-library.

Recording in detail the plants, birds, butterflies and insects which can be seen. The plant recording will be done in association with the Somerset Botanical Group.

For fellowship groups and the younger generations to be practically involved.

Leading local eco walks – trees, flowers, butterflies.

Please let the office know if you have any thoughts and ideas; **pray** that we will continue to grow in wisdom and discernment as we seek to honour the Creator and engage with Creation.

'Lord, through your Word and Holy Spirit, and the beauty of your creation, help us to bring spiritual depth to the task of caring for the earth.' Amen
