WHAT'S THE POINT OF TRINITY CHURCH?

Then the eleven disciples went to Galilee, to the mountain where Jesus had told them to go. When they saw him, they worshipped him; but some doubted. Then Jesus came to them and said, 'All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptising them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age.' Matthew 28.16-20

In recent years TED talks have become an internet phenomenon. These are videos from expert speakers on all manner of subjects – in education, business, science and creativity. Some speakers are famous. Some have become famous because of their TED talk. One such person is Simon Sinek, whose 2010 TED talk remains one of the most watched. He speaks about business and marketing, yet his guiding principle is seen in Jesus' final words to his disciples as recorded by Matthew.

Sinek bases his whole talk (and his books that followed) on one simple premise: start with 'Why?' All organisations know what they do, many know how to do it well, but only a very few know why they are doing it. Those that do act very differently; its why Apple has built an army of advocates and Mac-evangelists. It's how people buy not just a product but into a lifestyle. It's being driven by a dream, as so famously demonstrated by Martin Luther King.

It's also framed the questions that have been gripping me in my first few months here in Frome as Vicar of Holy Trinity. What's the point of Trinity Church? Do we know our purpose, our 'Why?' And what difference does it make to our lives and those around us? I'm convinced that Jesus fully understood his 'Why?' Knowing his true identity, he embraced God's calling even though it led him to the cross. And he inspired his followers to be his disciples. Peter, John, James and the others caught from Jesus their true God- given purpose and calling as we see at the very end of Matthew's Gospel.

Jesus didn't just give them a command; he gave them a purpose. They are to be his disciples who then make disciples. Disciples are followers of Jesus who know their 'Why?' They have committed themselves to following him, are empowered by the Holy Spirit to live for him, and are passionate about serving him. All they do, and how they do it, comes from this life-changing relationship.

It's still the same for us today. The point of Trinity Church - indeed all churches - is to be Jesus' disciples who, empowered by the Holy Spirit to work together, make disciples. It undergirds our worship, our praying, our love for each other and our community. It is our plumbline to measure all we do, the basis upon which we serve our community, the light that shines from us across Frome.

Let's catch what it means to be Jesus' disciples who know their purpose to help others follow Jesus, that they also may know his love, forgiveness, hope and purpose for their lives.

Greetings Trinity family!

I hope you are all keeping well and warm, as I am writing this article the weather is below freezing!

I thought this month I would draw your attention to the importance of bowel screening. If you have any concerns, I am always happy to chat to you in confidence or accompany you to see your GP.



Bowel cancer screening

NHS bowel cancer screening checks if you could have bowel cancer.

Blood in stool can be a sign of polyps or bowel cancer. Polyps are growths in the bowel. They are not cancer, but may turn into cancer over time. If the test finds anything unusual, you might be asked to go to hospital to have further tests.

Always see a GP if you have symptoms of bowel cancer at any age, even if you have recently completed a NHS bowel cancer screening test kit – do not wait to have a screening test.

Why screening is offered

Regular NHS bowel cancer screening reduces the risk of dying from bowel cancer, the 4th most common type of cancer. Screening can help prevent bowel cancer or find it at an early stage, when it's easier to treat.

How to get a home test kit

Everyone aged 60 to 74 years who is registered with a GP and lives in England is automatically sent an NHS bowel cancer screening kit every 2 years. The programme has also started to include 58 year olds, so you may get a test before you're 60. Make sure your GP practice has your correct address so your kit is posted to the right place.

If you're 75 or over, you can ask for a kit every 2 years by phoning the free

bowel cancer screening helpline on 0800 707 60 60. If you're worried about a family history of bowel cancer or have any symptoms, speak to a GP for advice.

How to use the home test kit

The NHS bowel cancer screening kit used in England is the faecal immunochemical test kit – known as the FIT kit. You collect a small sample of poo on a small plastic stick and put it into the sample bottle and post it to a lab for testing. There are instructions that come with the kit.

A better way

Culture, it's said, is 'how things get done around here'. This suggests that our understanding of the world is largely formed by our experiences and what we're accustomed to. That's all fine until everything around us, as it does, keeps on changing. Then we're then set on a collision course between how we think things should be, and how they actually are. Anybody aged over 40 who's had to ask a nine year old how to use their new phone will understand this dilemma perfectly.

Cultural collisions aren't just restricted to technology. They affect churches too. Many of us grew up with a model of church set up by the Victorians. This mostly meant that each parish had one church building with its own vicar, who took responsibility for most aspects of the ministry needed in a particular place. Yet even this was new in its day. Look much further back and things worked very differently. The New Testament speaks of churches where lots of different people played many different roles, each operating out of the particular skills and gifts given them by God. In Ephesians the writer describes a church where 'some [are] apostles, some prophets, some evangelists, some pastors and teachers'.

So what would be the right model of church for our day? The Victorians' assumption that the vicar would do almost everything would seem to be a crying waste of the gifts and passions that together we share. And as more of our clergy care for three, six or more parishes, the nineteenth century model is increasingly leaving our vicars tired, overstretched and liable to burn out.

We need a better way; one that draws on the rich talents, abilities and skills that our church members have. Here in Bath and Wells we're calling this 'shared local ministry'. Examples of what that can look like exist in many places around our diocese. Neither first century nor nineteenth century, but an emerging twenty first century way of how we want 'to get things done around here'. A better way to inhabit well the faith we've inherited in our time and generation.

MISSIONS

We had a brilliant but exhausting 10 day visit to Marsabit last year, our first visit since 2019. We visited 9 parishes and 5 schools, consecrated two new churches, helped with the graduation of 17 young evangelists in the desert village of Bubisa, and met with the clergy chapter. We looked at 4 possible sites for the new Girls High School, and were soaked by a rare and miraculous shower, while visiting a water harvesting project! And this week, Jomo, the Diocesan Youth Coordinator, has organised a Youth conference, to which 300 youngsters have come from across all the people groups. How promising for the future!



Thank the Lord for all the life and energy in the Diocese, despite the challenges. Please pray all these encouraging initiatives may flourish, and especially for the Girls High School, that a suitable plot can be chosen, and the school begin.

And huge challenges there are: FAMINE RAVAGES THE LAND. You can hear about it on the news: in the Horn of Africa - Somaliland, Somalia, N. Kenya and on to N. Uganda – the rains have failed or been poor for over 3 years. Over 80% of livestock in N. Kenya have died – camels, cows and goats, which are the assets and savings of the different nomadic and Pastoralist peoples who criss-cross this arid and semi-arid land. There has been some famine relief from the Government, but it barely tides people over. People may be dying from starvation, but who knows? Few governments will admit that their people are dying. The Diocese has received and given out about £61,000 relief through two donor organisations, but the Bishop is at his wit's end to know which way to turn for relief. For many, it is a matter of life and death; for parents it's almost impossible to pay school fees; and for the church it impacts on paying Parish share and clergy salaries.

We know there's a Cost-of-Living crisis for many but we do pray that some of you might spare something for the people in these remote regions, whom

you've been supporting and praying for over the years. **If you are able and willing to provide support to send to Marsabit please contact us.**



And even if you are unable to help financially, please would you **Pray for rain, that the Lord would open the heavens, and pour out the life-giving water that the people, the land and the animals are crying out for.**

The other challenge is Insecurity. It had been causing so much fear and distress. We saw burnt out villages and houses; we heard how people

ensured they were home by 5pm because the streets of Marsabit were too dangerous; we met old friends who had fled to Nairobi because they were on a hit list.

It was thought the General Election on August 9th, and the rivalry of powerful politicians jockeying for position, was causing the unrest. **But, Hallelujah, the elections went off peacefully!** Now, newly elected President Ruto is calming things down and security is much improved. While staying at St. Stephen's, the Diocesan Training Centre, there was a gathering of people from different faith communities and people groups, who were wrestling with post-violence reconciliation. There is peace, but it is a fragile thing, and it can be lonely and frustrating being a peacemaker.

Please pray for them, the peacemakers, and that peoples might be and remain truly reconciled.

We are thankful that Bishop Qampicha's back is less sore so travelling isn't quite so tough. We hope to organise a visit by him and Safia to the UK in June/July 2023!!! – more news later, but please let us know if you would like to meet them.

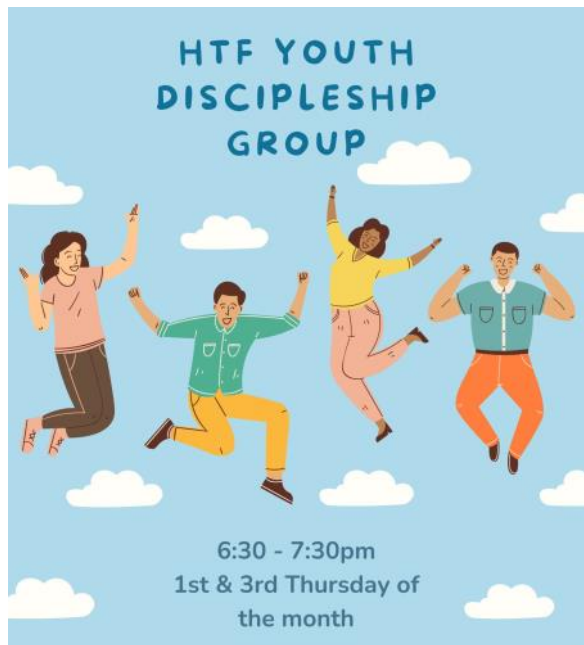
No gardening expertise is needed, just willing hands. It would be great if we can clear the path beside the car park as well.

NEWS FROM THE BRIDGE CAFE

We recently read an entry for Day 6 in the rather lovely Prayer Diary, "Called by God", produced by HOPE, Frome and Villages.

" We are called by God to live as members of the Body of Christ in our local communities, accepting each person as precious in the sight of God".

We both immediately thought of the work of The Bridge Cafe, and how those of us who work there strive to accept each person who walks through our door as precious in God's eyes. For all we know, being greeted by name with a warm smile, and an interest in how they are, may be of great significance to someone, who is perhaps lonely or going through a tough time, as so many are in these difficult days. To facilitate a community in which people can be welcomed with love, served a hot, comforting drink and meal and also given the opportunity to form meaningful friendships, is all part of our calling to be salt and light in our community.

Our fortnightly Sunday Afternoon Teas are a further way of having this gentle, but powerful influence, as we eat tea and play Board Games together, with a speaker sharing something of their faith in Christ, bringing Light and Hope in these dark and difficult times. We have been running the Teas since October and have averaged 10 to 12 guests. Our last Tea before Christmas coincided with the day of the Trinity Carol Service and it was so good to be overflowing with guests, and to then see a good number of them walk up to the church.

We have had a reasonable number of new people frequenting the cafe during the week, and our income has been steadily increasing, alongside Trinity folk's helpful financial contributions. This has enabled us to use vouchers to either cover or subsidise meals for those going through tough times. Our very positive and stable financial position has also meant that we have been able to install acoustic panelling, and in addition buy an extractor fan to go over the hob. Before Christmas we purchased 6 generous Asda vouchers and gave them out to families with children, who

are known to us through cafe contacts. The vouchers were delivered with a box of chocolates and a card saying they came with the love and prayers of The Bridge Cafe, part of Holy Trinity Church. We worked carefully with Tony as he supported needy people at Christmas through The Hardship Fund, to ensure there was no inappropriate overlap.

You may be interested to know that there are still some opportunities to serve as a volunteer at The Bridge Cafe. A shift lasts from 11 to 1.30, once a week, or once a fortnight, and can involve serving at the tables, washing up, befriending people or preparing food. Cooking meals and cakes can be done at the cafe outside of opening hours, or at home if you are willing to have your kitchen inspected and certified by Mendip District Council Environmental Health (not a threatening process at all!) Please approach us if you are interested in helping, either in person at church, or email us at john_rootes@yahoo.co.uk.

We will then meet with you to discuss the opportunities for service, and to discern where your particular gifts might be best used. We can't guarantee a volunteering post at the present, but some posts may become vacant in the future as people either retire or move on.

The Hope Frome prayer diary quoted from earlier continued with these very pertinent Scriptures:

" You are the salt of the earth. But if the salt loses its saltiness, how can it be made salty again?You are the light of the world. A city on a hill cannot be hidden.....In the same way let your light shine before others, that they may see your good works and glorify your Father in Heaven. Matthew 5:13a, 14, 16

MOTHERS' UNION

Beckington Mothers' Union Branch met for their Annual General Meeting on 11th January. We were pleased to use the MU tablecloth which Sue Martin had brought back for us from Marsabit and we look forward to her being one of our speakers this year.



We began with a short service and then discussed ideas for this year's programme. One member has been making toilet bags for the Women's Refuge so we are all going to take an item to each meeting to help fill them.

MU is bringing literacy hope in DRC. Basic literacy skills are essential for women in building confidence, asserting their rights, generating an income and addressing the needs of their families. MU literacy circles give them tools to share knowledge in a wide range of areas, including agriculture. Joining an MU literary circle (which is part of the Mothers' Union Adult Literacy & Agriculture Programme) has given members new confidence, insight and agricultural knowledge.

Groups come together to make handicrafts, garden or bake, as well as planting trees to prevent landslides and protect their environment. The project's focus on agriculture means they are practicing new techniques, growing new varieties of vegetables at different times of the year, to benefit from higher prices which helps increase their family nutrition and income. Participants find hope for the future and become role models in their communities.

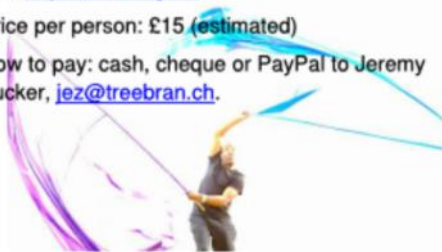

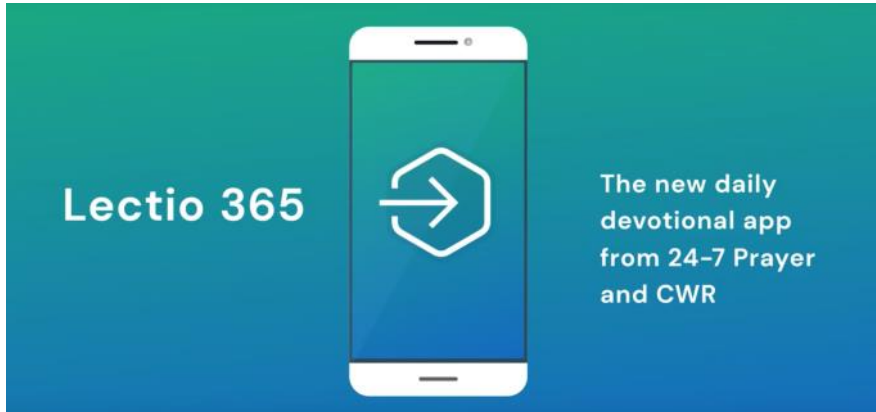
KEEPING IN TOUCH

FROM THE OFFICE



Stamps: We collect all used postage stamps; international stamps from other countries are especially appreciated. Tear off just the stamp, leaving about 1cm of paper around the stamp. Place them in the pink box at the back of the church. PLEASE REMOVE ANY PLASTIC BAGS.

Used inkjet printer cartridges: We can recycle the following brands only - Canon, Dell, HP, Lexmark, Neopost and Samsung. Only the cartridge is needed, none of the other packaging.

FOIL lined packets: We collect these as well as sweet and chocolate wrappers, and CLEAN food packets (such as pasta or rice bags for recycling). All recycling needs to be clean and dry. NO BAGS THAT HAVE HAD WET FOOD IN THEM.

Writing instruments: Any brand of pen, felt tip, highlighter, marker, correction fluid pot, correction tape, mechanical pencil and eraser pen regardless of their composition. Please note **no glue sticks**, wooden pencils, chalk, glue sticks, erasers, rulers or other cutting objects that could disturb the recycling process.

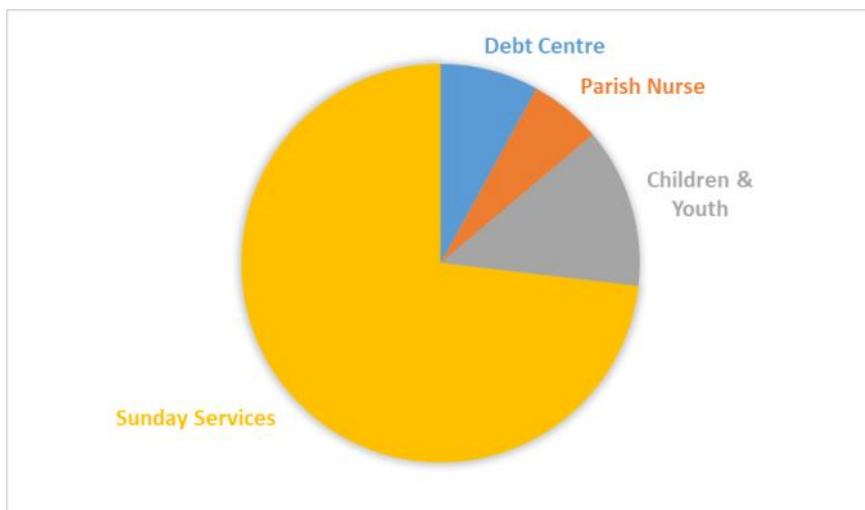
