in Word and Spirit ministry. His proven track record in leadership will be of real significance at Holy Trinity as we move into exciting but unchartered waters. His passion for preaching, mission and discipleship will enable this community to navigate the tricky waters that lie ahead for the Anglican Church on a local level, as well as on the national stage. He is passionate about mission, evangelism and discipleship; he's full of vision and dynamism and has a proven track record in leadership. He is energetic, full of the Holy Spirit and full of fun, too!

PARISH NURSE

Greetings Trinity family!

I hope the beautiful sunshine we've had today as I write this has continued into July and you are all enjoying our newfound post-Covid freedom with family and friends! Don't forget to wear your hat and apply sun screen when out in the summer sun. And keep hydrated with plenty of fluids (8-10 cups daily!) and not too many caffeinated drinks!

Such good news that our new vicar Ian has been announced and will be joining us with his wife Jo and family in the near future! I'm really looking forward to meeting them and sharing their vision for Holy Trinity moving forward.

This month I thought I would talk about exercising when you find it difficult due to a chronic condition or following surgery. We all know moving more is good for us. But knowing the level of activity that's right for you, can be difficult.

Being more active isn't about working up a sweat. It's just about moving more each day in whatever way works for you. Below are some activities that could help.

Regular standing

If you sit down a lot during the day, try to get up once an hour. If that's not possible, moving your arms and legs for a few minutes will help.

Standing without help

Work towards pushing up from sitting in a chair to a standing position without using a walker or leaning on someone else.



- Sit on a chair without arm rests, with your arms across your chest.
- Lean forward.
- Put your weight on your feet while leaning forward.
- Stand up by straightening your knees. Sit down again.
- Repeat this as many times as you feel able.

Try to do this exercise 3 to 5 times a day.

Gentle stretches

Try some gentle stretches in bed or a chair every day to keep supple.

- While sitting or lying, bring your toes towards your shin and then point them toward the floor. Repeat for both feet.
- Sitting on a chair, lift your leg up off the seat, keeping your knee bent. Return to starting position and repeat.
- Sitting on a chair, pull your toes up, tighten your thigh muscle and straighten your knee. Hold for about 5 seconds, if you

can, and then slowly relax your leg. Repeat for both legs.

• Sitting on a chair with your feet on the floor, bend your knee as much as possible. Repeat for both legs.

Sitting on a stool, let your back drop and get rounded, then use your back muscles to straighten your back and arch it (but not too much!).

Walking between rooms

Walk from one room to another and back if you're steady on your feet, and time how long it takes. Try to beat your time each day.

Fitter feet

Problems with your feet can stop you getting out and about. They can also affect your balance and increase the risk of falling. So, it's important to look after your feet, and report problems such as foot pain and decreased feeling to a healthcare professional.

Podiatry outreach continues at Holy Trinity every two months and is kindly funded by Frome Rotary and Lions Club Frome. Caroline is a Registered Podiatrist who gives the treatment at a subsidised rate of £20 to those who otherwise could not afford this valuable service.

How can I look after my feet?

A simple foot routine will help keep your feet in good condition, including:

- wearing suitable footwear
- keeping your toenails short
- regularly moisturising your feet
- checking for cracked skin, blisters and signs of infection.

Which types of shoes are best for my feet?

You may find that trainers or well-cushioned shoes are more comfortable than ordinary shoes and offer welcome support.

These footwear tips can help you feel more confident on your feet.

- Always wear shoes or slippers. To avoid slips, never walk indoors in bare feet, socks or tights.
- Wear shoes that fit well. High-sided shoes with low heels, thin soles and a good grip are a good choice.
- Avoid wearing sandals and shoes with high heels.
- Wear slippers that have a good grip and fasten up. Loose or worn out slippers may cause you to trip.

Where can I get my toenails clipped?

Good nail care can help to keep feet feeling comfortable. Nails that are too long can press against the end of the shoe and the constant pressure can cause soreness. Toenails that have been poorly cut can also become ingrown.

If you're struggling to cut your own nails, ask a friend or family member for help. You may be eligible for free podiatry if you are diabetic. Ask your GP surgery. I know it is getting more difficult to access free care. Why should I get my feet checked?

Common problems like corns, cracked skin and ingrown toenails can be treated successfully. Conditions like diabetes or circulatory problems can all be picked up by looking at the feet.

If you have a long-term condition, such as diabetes, **arthritis** or chronic problems with blood circulation in your legs, your feet are particularly vulnerable. Check your feet

regularly and ensure you attend check-ups as requested. If you notice any problems, report them to your doctor as soon as possible.

THOUGHTS ON THE MEANING OF COMMUNITY

(talk by Jane Stafford following the theme of Life Matters)

To give you some context, I lived at the heart of Christian communities for 20 years and worked in a secular community setting for 15 years so it is a subject I am passionate about but also find very challenging. In talking to you about this, please hear that I am very much challenging myself too.

The dictionary definition of community is a social group of any size whose members often have a common cultural heritage. The dictionary describes fellowship as being a common interest or feeling.

Do you think either of these definitions accurately describes us at HTF? Try this....

Acts 2 talks about 'The fellowship of believers' – this is what it says.

The people devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and to fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer. Everyone was filled with awe at the many wonders and signs performed by the apostles. All the believers were together and had everything in common. They sold property and possessions to give to anyone who had need. Every day they continued to meet together in the temple courts. They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts, praising God and enjoying the favour of all people. And the Lord added to their number daily those who were being saved.

Now how well do we think we are doing?

If I'm honest, I'm not seeing as many wonders and signs as I would like. I haven't sold any personal possessions in order to give to someone in need. And I don't think decluttering and dumping my unwanted goods off at the charity shop counts! I do praise God and share meals with people in my home, but they are mainly close friends.

This led me to think about Jesus's disciples. Surely, this was the first community or house group. What a motley crew they were! I can't imagine that Matthew the former tax collector was very happy about associating with smelly fishermen like Simon Peter! And what about James and John who Jesus called 'Sons of thunder.' How did they get on with more sensitive characters like Thomas? But Jesus didn't make any allowances, did he? I don't suppose he said 'mmm... yes Matthew, I can see that Peter's not your type, why don't you pop over on a day when he's out fishing.

So, this makes me feel that although community is something to strive for and something most of us would say we want, true community in the biblical sense is costly. **True community in the biblical sense is costly.**

Community or fellowship is different to a clique which is defined as, 'a small exclusive group of people'.

Are we at HTF a community made up of different cliques? How do we know if we have inadvertently fallen into the clique trap?

It is so easy and quite natural to mix with people who are likeminded or the same age and stage as us and there is nothing wrong in that. However, if we take the example of Jesus's disciples and the early Christians in Acts, a Christian community is so much more than just a group of likeminded friends who have lots in common. Do you agree?

Being a true Christlike community, I think is hard. It takes courage and humility. It requires us to go out of our comfort zones. It means forgetting oneself, laying down our preferences and putting up with what other people like. It means forgiving one another regularly. It means not taking offence. It means taking an interest in someone different to yourself. It means speaking to one another in love with grace when we encounter problems in relationships. It means not always thinking we are right. This is everyone's responsibility.

I think there are some practical things we could do to ensure that we don't become a community of separate cliques or lonely individuals meeting in the same building on a Sunday.

These are my suggestions; you may have others you want to add.

- If you feel annoyed at people not talking to you, why don't you make the first move and approach others and find out about them? You may have to do this several times.
- If you feel left out of the young family's group over there by the side chapel, why don't you go and chat to them or volunteer to put the creche toys out.
- Young families, invite someone older or single to lunch if you are feeding all those mouths, you may as well feed one more and I bet they would help with the washing up!
- Sit in a different seat each week, commit to getting to know someone new to you. Perhaps we should have a 3-minute rule at the start of each service where we talk to someone we don't know or don't usually talk to?
- If you don't normally, you could attend a couple of Wild Worship sessions or the 9 o'clock service just to show your support. Does it really matter once in a while if you get a bit wet or if the worship at the 9 o'clock isn't to your taste?

If you are single and want to invite people for supper but don't want to do it by your-

self, why don't you buddy up with a friend and invite a load of random people over? I know this is something practised by Jackie Platt and Felicity Jones.

If all your church friends are the same colour, age, stage, gender, sexual orientation etc why don't you make an effort to connect with someone who is different to yourself?

If you have been in the same home group for more than three years perhaps you have become too comfortable. Consider switching groups or even starting one of your own.

My conclusion (or perhaps St Paul's) is that belonging to a Christian Community is about 'being completely humble and gentle; being patient, bearing with one another in love' as stated in Ephesians 4:2

It seems to me that when the early believers and disciples shared all they had, when they accepted one another and met regularly, when they showed love to those outside of their social group *then* they began to see signs and wonders. *Then* the Lord add to their number daily. Is that what we want at HTF? Or is it too costly? Are we happier having our own way with liturgy, songs, service structure etc.? Do we have the humility and courage to move away from our own comfortable social group? Can we forgive and not take offence? Can we learn to prefer one another's needs?

John 13 verses 34 and 35 says;

Love one another. As I have loved you so you must love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples. Perhaps it's only when we achieve these things, through the power of the Holy Spirit, that we will see the spiritual breakthrough in our community that we are all longing for.

National Women's Day

Women's conference

About 90 women came to the conference and 41 of them wanted to continue hearing and discussing, coming together. E.C. Bitola started one group, with joy and lots of hope and soon to be little disappointed to see some women changing their mind, yet we continue to pray and trust in the work of the Holy Spirit, do our part of inviting and being there for those who decide to come, praying for continuing guidance.





Easter gifts

Shopping bags filled with New Testament and Christian books were delivered on the street. People showed a lot of interest to get one and all 150 bags were given out in about an hour. Again, this gave an opportunity to be out on the street and point out God is real and alive, has risen from the dead to prove there is resurrection and eternal life. A few stayed to talk but all of them have the books and we continue to pray that God will use the books and the words to speak to their hearts and open their eyes to see Him.

MISSIONS

Brigit met her 'deadline' of being able to back in church for Easter, and is now back to full health, eating and drinking normally, and even starting to run/jog again. Thank you for all your prayers and love during the past 9 months! When she was having chemotherapy, she decided once she was well again she would like to do a road-trip to visit family and friends who have supported and encouraged us during the past year. Chris and Miriam kindly lent us their campervan so that we could take our dog with us and in May we spent 2 weeks taking a circuitous route up to Edinburgh and back again. It was such a blessing to be able to stay wherever suited us and enjoy the occasional sightseeing stop. An additional blessing was that while we were in York Brigit was able to make an unscheduled side-trip to Cumbria to visit her sister who has been unwell for several years, which proved to be the last time she would see her. Although this was an added sadness in a difficult year we are glad that her distressing decline is over.

Mike has started working with a friend to develop the 'Blended Learning' training format that was pioneered by the Indonesia FRR (First Response Radio) team last year. All FRR training for the last 15 years has been in a face to face, in-class, training environment, but we all learned during the Covid19 Pandemic that we can do much more online via video calls. Also, many trainees are reluctant, or not yet allowed to return to full in-class training. FRR plans to develop a hybrid system starting with online training and then transitioning to essential hands-on training for the equipment. We need to develop the full training package so all our international teams can take advantage of what our first teams have learned already.

Mike and a group of 'techies' met in Worthing a couple of weeks ago to work on a re-design of the essential 'radio studio in a suitcase' elements. The original suitcase had many components that were then highly customized, took a long time to assemble and was expensive. The idea was to create a version that would use off the shelf equipment with minimal customization. Praise God technology has advanced so much that we can do more with less equipment.

Far East Broadcasting Company (FEBC), our sending mission, has a total of eight radio stations in Ukraine, but two have been destroyed since the start of the conflict in February. In addition to radio, our staff are using internet-based broadcasts on Facebook, YouTube, and other social media. Pray for the safety of our staff and for God's protection over our facilities in the country.

Brigit has offered to help with ESOL (English for Speakers of Other Languages) and hopes to start tutoring

a Ukrainian woman in Frome soon. We'll be returning to the USA in August/ September for a wedding and are looking for someone to house and dog-sit. Please let us know if you have any ideas.

- pray that we can find a house/dog sitter for the time we are away
- pray for Mike and Terry and Dave as they finish off assembling the suitcase porotype

A glimpse into Heaven (A precis of Revelation)

John, much-loved disciple of Jesus, lived to a great age. Revelation, the last book of the Bible, records John's vision of the future. It is written in picture language, a code that Jewish and Christian readers at the time would understand. It was probably written at a time when the Roman emperor was persecuting the church.

John himself had been sent to a prison camp on the island of Patmos, when, one Sunday morning, Jesus appeared to him, shining with glory. Only one person among the multitudes in heaven was fit to undo the seal and set the events of the world in motion. That person was Jesus.

John gazed, expecting to see a strong, lion-like figure, but Jesus looked like a lamb ready for sacrifice. He is the Lamb of God, who died to take away the sin of the world.

When Jesus took the scroll, thousands upon thousands in heaven burst out singing, "Worthy is the Lamb who was slain! To receive power and glory and blessing!"

As Jesus began to unroll the future, John knew for certain that God is in control.

Satan, the old enemy of God, has plunged into sin and suffering. But Jesus has won the victory against evil, by dying and rising to life for ever.

Then John saw the end of everything old and ugly and spoiled, and the beginning of a new world, fresh and lovely and good.

No one who might spoil that lovely world could be allowed in, but only those made clean by Jesus. Everyone who says "No" to Jesus in his lifetime and refuses his forgiveness will be sent far away from God.

'I saw a new heaven and a new earth,' John wrote. 'And I heard a loud voice saying, "Now God's home is with mankind. God himself will be with them. He will wipe away all tears. There will be no more death, no more grief or crying with pain. God's Holy City has no need of sun or moon, because the glory of God shines on it, and the Lamb is its light." '

How John longed for that day to come! 'I am coming very soon!' Jesus promised. And gladly John answered, 'Yes, Lord Jesus – please come!'



HOPE FROME

HISTORY OF HOPE FROME

HOPE Frome started in 2008 as part of a nationwide vision to bring Christian denominations and groups uniting in prayer, community action and outreach. In Frome that manifested itself as town-wide litter picks, supporting activities such as the Food Festival (setting up and taking down tents, litter clearance etc) and liaising with the police and town council to start the HOPE Coffee Van to help combat late night unrest in the town centre. Over the years the coffee van provided countless cups of tea, coffee and hot chocolate to the late-night population of Frome, and was acknowledged by the police as being instrumental in alleviating unrest there.

The HOPE Oasis stall at Frome's Independent Market was established with the intent to provide a connection to the very busy market for the Christian communities of Frome. The Oasis provided a gazebo to sit and chat under and free cups of water for market customers. Monthly Oasis volunteers also took part in a publicly open moment of reflection on the Lord's Supper at noon. The stall also became a go-to spot for lost children and medical responders and was a monthly stop for a number of regular market visitors and stall holders. The Independent Market and HOPE Oasis stopped operating in 2020 due to Covid. When invited to restart the Oasis, HOPE struggled to find volunteers available to operate the stall to keep it operational.

One of the challenges has been to know what the priorities for regular community outreach in Frome are and how we can deliver them. After consultation with the local police, YMCA and the town council, a priority in Frome was identified as building bridges with the youth in the parks and open spaces, where drinking and drugs have been identified as a concern. This ties in with the work that the Frome Deanery Pioneer Missioners, Andrew and Elizabeth Alden are already doing.

WHO IS HOPE FROME?

A small (but hopefully growing!) group of people are involved in looking for opportunities to represent the Christian community serving Frome in practical ways. More people are needed to be viable – we hope that everyone from all churches in Frome will consider being involved in HOPE Frome in some way.

HOW CAN YOU BE INVOLVED?

Children's Festival

HOPE Frome has been asked and agreed to support the Children's Festival in August. On Sunday August 21st from 10 am to 4 pm, we will be manning a water & respite tent in Welshmill Park for Children Festival attendees. We need DBS checked volunteers to man the gazebo in 1 or 2 hour shifts, welcoming guests and offering them water and/or a place to sit and recover from the days activities. HOPE Frome In Parks And Open Spaces

A few of us have committed to walk in the parks/open spaces at least one evening every two weeks. One evening we were able to talk to some people about the recent violence in Frome. Another evening we set up a pizza oven by the coffee shop area of Victoria Park. 15 young people came to join us and made their own pizza, including a mixed group of young men/women skateboarders. Their whole group came over and settled to join us and spent a fair bit of time with us, rather than just 'grab and go'. We learned later that some of this group have connections to youth at Holy Trinity. It was encouraging to connect with a group we might build further links with.

Sign up to volunteer and/or pray for HOPE Frome, particularly in the parks and open spaces. Although we are still in the exploratory phase of the project, the long term aim is to provide training for small groups to be able to engage with and build relationships with young people in Frome, ideally through activities and interaction in various venues and the open spaces. 
