## Manna mailing – June 2022 Generosity of service – it's contagious.

It is always inspiring to hear how individuals or churches are serving those in their community. Recently the actions of residents of the village of North Moreton in Oxfordshire hit the news when they came together to offer support for 60 refugees fleeing the devastation in Ukraine.

Gary Watson, Giving and Funding Adviser for Bath and Wells said, "The idea apparently came from one individual who wanted to help as she has friends in Ukraine. The village is home to around 350 people but it took just one person to start the conversation about how she was going to help. From that, others were inspired and motivated to do the same, resulting in a co-ordinated offering of homes, transport, healthcare and even teaching for children in the village hall while they wait for places at local schools. A fantastic example of how contagious generosity can be!"

Gary adds, "Much of our behaviour is influenced by our observations of those around us. We are led by example, both positively and negatively, by words or deeds or their very absence. That's why it's so important for us to have people who will commit to be the examples of generous service needed to influence real change in the lives of our communities. Jesus knew the importance of serving as he humbly washed his disciples' feet, giving us the very example of servanthood and a command to do the same."

This month we celebrate the 70 years of service the Queen has given to our nation and the difference this has made. We could all take this opportunity to reflect on the ways we have (or haven't) served those around us and move forwards with a resolve to be examples of the generous love we have received from God in Jesus.

#### News in brief

#### New bishop announced

On 28 April 2022 Downing Street announced that the Rt Revd Michael Beasley will be the next Bishop of Bath and Wells. Currently the Bishop of Hertford, prior to taking a fulltime role with the church, Bishop Michael was an epidemiologist, a background he was called on to use during the pandemic as a member of the Church of England's Covid task force. He is already familiar with Somerset. His wife Lizzie is from a local farming family and before his

interview for the role they both undertook a 60 mile walk around the county.

A warm welcome for Bishop Michael

On the day it was announced that he is to become the next Bishop of Bath and Wells, Bishop Michael undertook a 10-hour, 84-mile tour of the diocese. He met with a variety of people, undertook media interviews and attended a host of events at churches and in the community. The children of St Mary's primary in Bridgwater were delighted to be the first to hear the news of his appointment at 10am.

#### **Celebrating together**

St Petrock's in Timberscombe, deep in the heart of Exmoor, is just one of our churches who will be celebrating the Platinum Jubilee with their community. They are holding a three-day open Village and Church Heritage Exhibition on 2-3 June, and again on Monday 6 June for local school children.

Churchwarden Marion Jeffrey says, "It is our hope that visitors and villagers who may not normally enter the church will be able to visit and enjoy this event along with others."

On display will be historic church documents and some recent archaeological findings.

Alongside this will be the school's Platinum Jubilee creative work and villagers' royal memorabilia.

### 50 years of supporting children

Margot Sampson MBE has just stepped down as chair of The Children's Society Winscombe St James Fundraising Committee, after 23 years.

#### How did you get involved with the Children's Society?

It has played a significant role in my life for over 50 years. It all began when I was a young mother, when our then Vicar, Revd. Bernard Salmon approached me when the existing representative retired. At that time there were just six charity boxholders who met once a year.

#### How did you get on at first?

I felt committed to ongoing support once I discovered what it was all about. My own background did not prepare me for what I was to learn about the lives of so many of the young people with whom I had lived and gone to school. It was a learning experience for which I was totally unprepared and it mortified me.

#### How have things changed over the years?

We have learned to adapt to the changing needs and attitudes of society. We used to knock on every door for our annual collection but now we collect at local supermarkets. At our height we had 127 box holders.

#### Is there anything in particular you have enjoyed?

Paul and Mo's Open Garden Day and our Christingle Services. Their ability to communicate Christian love and fellowship through superb food and comradeship is incredible. We were one of the first churches in the UK to introduce Christingles and because we live in a cider area, we represent the world with an apple from the Church orchards.

#### How do you feel about your time with the Children's Society?

It has been for me a truly meaningful and appreciated part of my life. Because of my involvement with the Children's Society I have learned so much and I give it – and always will – my deepest thanks and love.

## Breaking down the barriers of loneliness

Active and In Touch will focus on the impact of loneliness with the *Above and Beyond Fundraising Appeal* during National Loneliness Week between 13<sup>th</sup> and 17<sup>th</sup> June. The charity supports over 300 people in Frome and neighbouring villages who are living alone at home.

According to the Campaign to End Loneliness

The number of over-50s experiencing loneliness is set to reach two million by 2025/6. A 49% increase in 10 years.

- Half a million older people go at least five or six days a week without seeing or speaking to anyone at all.
- Two out of five older people (about 3.9 million) say the television is their main company.

Social isolation and loneliness are real issues to many people. Lack of family contact, no friends or limited opportunity to go shopping, being house bound or unable to get active in the community have a real impact on physical and mental health.

Active and in Touch is changing this situation by supporting people and creating space and opportunities for them to make new friends and connections and develop a sense of belonging through a matched 1:1 befriending service.

Active and In Touch work closely with a broad range of health and wellbeing services including Frome Medical Centre, social care charities, Health Connectors, Village Agents and Frome Town Council.

Dougie Brown, Charity Manager says; "Loneliness is something which affects us all at some time in our lives. For older members of the community, this can have a real impact on physical and mental health.

Active in Touch's team of wonderful volunteers offer a lifeline to people who may be struggling alone at home. Knowing there is someone out there they can meet for cup of coffee and chat, help with shopping or providing some company can make all the difference.

In addition to the befriending service, the charity runs two weekly social groups and Active and In Touch Community Drivers, providing a lifeline for people living in Frome and neighbouring villages who could not otherwise access vital services such as attending medical appointments, going shopping, visiting family and friends or attending social events. They rely on a network of local volunteer drivers who give up their time to provide lifts within Frome and neighbouring villages, including visits to the Royal United Hospital in Bath. The charity is calling on the residents of Frome and surrounding villages to get behind the appeal by giving a donation, running an event, or involving their church, school. community group or business. It is also looking for volunteers to join the befriending service or signing up as a community driver.

We have 15 pitches available so it is on a first comefirst served basis, although people who would like to drive down for a day trip are most welcome.


To book, call the campsite on 01305 815199, and make sure that you reference 'Holy Trinity Frome' to ensure you are camping with the group.

# PARISH NURSE

**Greetings Trinity family!** 

Today as I write it has poured with rain, but we have had some gloriously warm days in May and I hope this will continue now in lune.

I hope you are all keeping well, please do contact me if you have any health concerns or worries about medication. I'm always happy to accompany someone to see their GP and advocate for them if need be. Sometimes our health system is quite difficult to navigate!

Mental Health Awareness week was in May and the theme was loneliness. Hopefully when you read this you will have seen the clip I am intending to play in church, highlighting mental health and the importance of talking to someone if we are struggling.

Let's also think about loneliness! Which the dictionary defines as "being without friends or companions" or "isolated". I can certainly relate to this as when I arrived in Frome five years ago this July I felt very lonely in a strange new town where I had no family or friends. I really thank God for Holy Trinity family and my amazing housegroup and group chat, where I can request instant prayer support which never fails to lift my mood!

A coalition of faith based charities called 'Christians Together against Loneliness' are





churches to engage in the national campaign – Let's Talk Loneliness, raising awareness of issues relating to loneliness and social isolation during Loneliness Awareness Week (17-21 June).

The government campaign aims to reduce the stigma of talking about loneliness. 'Let's Talk Loneliness' launched recently by Loneliness Minister Mims Davies.

The loneliness capital of Europe. The campaign is in response to increasing evidence that loneliness and isolation figures are increasing in the UK:

- Over 9 million people of all ages say they 'always' or 'often' feel lonely.
- With over 50% of those aged 75 living alone, older people are at greater risk of isolation.

9 million older people consider television as their main form of company.

With the UK often quoted as the 'loneliness

capital of Europe' Jeremy Sharpe, Chair of Christians Together explains:

'The Bible teaches us that we are all to care for those on the margins of society and, by definition, many people struggling with loneliness are often unseen. This provides a challenge in identifying those most at risk, but also provides an opportunity for us all to be alert and aware of those for whom this could be a part of their day to day lives. It is also often the case, particularly in rural areas, that church buildings are the only places to meet within the community. This should therefore provide a greater impetus to explore ways to reach and engage with people within our local neighbourhoods.'

#### The Coalition

Livability is one of ten organisations that form the coalition working alongside: Care Home Friends, FaithAction, Faith in Later Life, Germinate Arthur Rank Centre, Linking Lives UK, Parish Nursing Ministries UK, Pilgrim's Friend Society, The Gift of Years and the Salvation Army. The coalition were consulted on plans for the national campaign.

Corin Pilling, Deputy Director of Public Engagement at Livability said:

"We are proud to join the Christians Against Loneliness Coalition. A huge part of tackling loneliness is preventing it. By ensuring that everyone can continue to be part of the community, churches can be part of the solution. Those living with dementia run a particular risk of becoming hidden in our communities."

What can we as a church community do to prevent loneliness within our own church? Livability have some excellent short courses on a variety of health subjects. Here is a short bible study about community and how we can build it better within our church and beyond!

We humans are social beings – it's one of our most fundamental characteristics.

"If one part suffers, every part suffers with it; if one part is honoured, every part rejoices with it" (1 Corinthians 12:26)

Four hundred years ago, John Donne wrote those famous words, "No man is an island, entire of itself, every man is a piece of a continent, a part of the main", and they are just as relevant today.

The Bible too has much to say about corporate relationships, or community. From the beginning, God said, 'It is not satisfactory for man to be alone; I will make him a helper complementary to him'" (Genesis 2:18). Indeed, God himself is a community of persons, the Trinity, who created humans in his own image ("Let us make humankind in our image, after our likeness", Genesis 1:26). Jesus gathered a group of people together his twelve disciples, with others, to be the prototype of his new community.

So, we are on very solid ground when our focus is not simply on an individual

Christian's relationship with God, but also on the shared, communal dimension of our life together – the church.

How should we best understand our church, and how it functions?

The apostle Paul tells us it is like a human body, but how is that so? Question: Why did Paul use the body as a metaphor of the church? What are the similarities, and how does the human body's functioning illustrate our community relationship?

Some key points emerge from the passage: 1. Like constituent parts of a body, we are all very diverse, as individuals and as groups, each with our own special gifts and abilities (v 4-10) 2. But we are nevertheless members of just one body, not many (v 12-13) 3. There is only one head, one Lord, one Spirit, not several (v 4-6) 4. Each individual member is valuable – including those less visible (v 15-25) 5. The relationships are so closely connected and integrated that if just one person suffers (or rejoices), it has an immediate and profound effect on all the others (v 26). Think how a person feels when they have a toothache!

Human beings function best in groups – they were never designed to live alone. This propensity to band together and cooperate is instinctive, hard-wired into our DNA. The strength or weakness of our relationships, both individually and corporately, has a huge impact on our physical, mental and general health. But as a society we are not doing well with community relationships. Loneliness is

becoming a huge problem. One study showed that two-thirds of Britons say they have no one to speak to about mental health or relationships.

Mother Teresa expressed the matter succinctly: "The greatest disease in the West today is not TB or leprosy; it is being unwanted, unloved, and uncared for. There's a hunger for love."

In their study of human society, sociologists call the ties that bind people together in communities, social capital. If a neighbourhood has high social capital there is much connection, trust and cohesion. Two types of social capital are described. The first is all about bonding – tightly-knit groups who look, think and act like each other (family, friends, colleagues, and ethnic groups function in this way). However, generally speaking, there is less interest and welcome for people who are different. The second type of social capital is termed bridging. Here, people from one group reach out to another group that is very different. This is much more challenging, but it provides the opportunity to break down age-old barriers and bring new and fresh life to groups that hitherto had no interest in each other.

#### **Ouestions:**

 What causes a community to turn in on itself, to focus only on bonding, with no interest in bridging to other, different groups?

 Conversely, what might help such a community to turn its attention outwards?
 What groups exist in your locality that have little or no contact with our church? How might we as a church begin to make contact with them? Lifting the Lid on Mental Health several years ago was really successful. Please let me know if you'd like me to run it again. Or there is another Dementia Friendly Church which you might find helpful. Together let's all help combat loneliness within our church and in our local community too!

#### Our church community

- Looking again at our passage (1 Corinthians 12), where would you see our church's strengths?
- Research shows that community connection and support is one of the church's strongest cards. So how might your church strengthen its own community life?
- Could you extend this beyond the walls of the church, to people who would never normally darken the door of their local church?

Reflect on your experience of church community over the past years.

- What was your best experience of church community?
- ♦ Who was part of that community?
- How did their words and actions contribute to the wellbeing of the community?
- What was your part in it?
- What did you learn then that would help you today?

## **REACHING UPWARDS by Wendy Rootes**

"Brother Mark prayed, not with words, but by somehow igniting a candle flame within him that burned immensely tall, and sent up the smoke of his entreaty, which was all for Meriet......."

I read this rather moving description of prayer quite recently, as I was making my way through a rather wonderful collection of Medieval Whodunnits "The Cadfael Chronicles" by Ellis Peters. John and I would thoroughly recommend this series, by the way, as though they are full of sometimes grisly murder, mystery and suspense, at the same time they resonate a gentle, Godly Wisdom and Grace.

This description made me contemplate on how often our words don't seem enough in prayer, somehow failing to express that for which we are really longing. Or maybe we don't know what we should pray for. Often we become very tired of the sound of our own voices, but when we cease to speak, we can find the silence empty and oppressive.

At the same time it reminded me of a very recent experience in Salisbury Hospital, when admitted for a persistent lung infection. Omicrom was rife and I had to be moved twice because of outbreaks in the bays. Those of you who have experienced being moved around to different wards in hospitals will know what this feels like. Having just settled down, maybe making friends with one or two fellow patients, or getting familiar with the staff and routines, one has to start all over again. I anticipated the last move with dread as it was to a Covid Contact isolation bay on a ward I knew from experience to be very cold and unfriendly.

As I was wheeled into the bay I was met by a most wonderful sight, which dispelled the gloom I felt. The end of the bay was a wall of large windows overlooking the beautiful Wiltshire Countryside. Magnificent! I was wheeled to the corner and found I had been allocated the best spot on the bay. (Thank You, loving Heavenly Father!)

Not only was I a few feet from a huge window overlooking the fields, but as I sat in bed and looked ahead, the adjacent window gave a spectacular view of the rolling countryside leading two miles towards the city of Salisbury. There, directly in my view, was the tower and incredible spire of Salisbury Cathedral.

As the next 10 days passed, it became a focus for me, as I tried to pray, something which is rarely easy to do in hospital. As I gazed on the spire, which seemed to be reaching heavenward, I found myself inwardly gathering up the situations which were troubling me and without words I reached up, following the direction of the spire, and gave them to

God, who knows our every heartache and trouble and wants to take upon Himself the burdens we are not meant to carry.

The image of prayer from Cadfael, of igniting a candle flame within us, burning immensely tall, sending up the smoke of our entreaties to God, and the picture of the spire of Salisbury Cathedral soaring upwards, will always stay in my heart, reminding me that at the heart of prayer is wordless surrender.

- \* USED INKJET PRINTER CARTRIDGES for the following brands only: Canon, Dell, Hp, Lexmark, Neopost and Samsung. All others need to go to the recycling tip. Only the cartridge is needed, none of the other packaging.
- \* CRISP PACKETS, sweet and chocolate wrappers, and pasta packets for recycling. All recycling needs to be clean and dry. We do not take curb side recycling, such as cardboard and tins. Please ONLY bring what we can accept, and not things like paper and plastic which can be recycled at home.



Once again we find ourselves in that most hopeful of seasons...spring. Perhaps since Lockdown we have become more aware of nature coming back to life? Perhaps this year you have found that the challenges of day-to-day living mean you haven't had time to notice? Maybe your garden is grateful that we have recently had some rain after a dry April? Maybe you would rather it stopped? But we need rain. Here is the UK our dry spells are just that...spells soon punctuated by showers...but in so many parts of the world the words of Zechariah are more meaningful. No spring rain = no food. Too much spring rain= flooding=no food.

"Ask the LORD for rain in the springtime; it is the LORD who sends the thunderstorms. He gives showers of rain to all people, and plants of the field to everyone. (Zechariah 10.)"

God planned a world where climate was predictable. Not everywhere had the same climate, but it was possible to plan planting and harvesting and assume that rain would fall when it was expected. Because of climate change that is no longer the case. Now many places suffer severe water shortage, even when they also have floods.

Do we even think about the water we use? Probably not...unless there is a hosepipe ban it does not impact greatly on our lives. Elsewhere in the world it is very different. Some stark statistics from "Water Aid":

771 million people don't have clean water close to home.

1.7 billion people don't have a decent toilet of their own.

(WHO/UNICEF Joint Monitoring Programme 2021)

**31% of schools don't have clean water.** (WHO/UNICEF Joint Monitoring Programme

2020 Drinking water, sanitation and hygiene in schools: Global baseline report)

Every minute a newborn dies from infection caused by lack of safe water and an unclean environment. (WHO, 2015)

Diarrhoea caused by dirty water and poor toilets kills one child under the age of five every two minutes.

Based on Prüss-Ustün et al. (2014) and the Institute for Health Metrics and Evaluation (2018)

Around the world up to 443 million school days are lost every year because of water-related illnesses.

(Human Development Report, 2006)
Every single one of these is preventable.
We may not make a huge difference if we just try to "save water"...though that helps...but have you considered twinning your toilet? The ones in the church are twinned. (www.toilettwinning.org)
Look at the Water aid site. There is lots of information there on how we can help make a difference.

Remember this is not how God planned it. His promise to us is

"The desert and the parched land will be glad; the wilderness will rejoice and blossom. Like the crocus, it will burst into bloom; it will rejoice greatly and shout for joy. (Isaiah 35 vv 1-2)"

But meanwhile we must do what we can to alleviate the situation.
