The Bereavement Journey continues to run at Christchurch so please contact them if you wish to attend in future.



JENNIE HARE TESTIMONY

Our daughter-in-law Jennie Hare has been on the prayer list on the weekly bulletin for many, many months. Jennie is married to our son John and they have one child Issie who is now aged 13.

Ten years ago Jennie discovered that she had a very rare auto immune disease that was attacking her own liver, and eventually after several years of struggling with very poor health, she was given a liver transplant about 2 1/2 years ago. As a result of the liver transplant, Jennie had to have medication to stop her new liver being rejected. This unfortunately caused her to develop a lymphoma, a cancer of the lymphatic system. As a result, she became seriously ill and the hospital attempted immunotherapy, radiotherapy and then chemotherapy but none of them stopped the lymphoma and at the end of August 2022, just over a year ago, they received the devastating news that the hospital could do no more for her and that it was now a question of palliative care. Since that day Jennie has not received any treatment. We remember weeping together and with John and Jennie. Someone who knew of the situation sent us this prayer and they thought that we might like to pray it:

"May the Holy Spirit enhance all that is biologically possible and take it into the realms of the miraculous."

We prayed that prayer so, so many times. Jennie was referred to Dorothy House hospice and they were wonderful in providing support and care for the whole family. In January this year John who is a teacher in Bristol agreed with his school that he would not work this year so that he could spend time with Jennie in what was thought to be her last few months. In May this year Jennie turned yellow and we all feared the worst. This turned out to be something minor which was treated at the hospital.

During that process, they took a CT scan and, in July, Jennie and John were told that the hospital had looked at the scan and compared it with the one taken a year earlier, and it appeared that the lymphoma had shrunk. In August a special PET scan was carried out which showed no sign of the

lymphoma whatsoever. The hospital consultant said she could not give any explanation for this as Jennie had received no treatment for a year and that if she believed in miracles then this was one. We however do believe in God who can do miracles.

In September she wrote to Jennie's GP and they were copied into this letter. It read as follows "I met with Jennie and John. I was absolutely delighted and surprised to tell her that her recent scan has not demonstrated any residual lymphoma. This is difficult to explain. Clearly this is a big shock (in a good way!) for Jennie and her family. It will take a bit of time to get used to. I do not know the trajectory of her disease now, but I think there is a chance that it will not recur and she will go on to live a healthy life." Jennie has lost a lot of her strength over the last few years but she has begun to lead a slightly more normal life. She has started to drive and gently exercise once more.

We are conscious that there may be people reading this who haven't seen healing when they have prayed for it and we can only recall what John Wimber said "When I prayed for no one to be healed, no one was healed, when I started praying for many to be healed, some were healed."

We are so grateful for those of you who have been praying for Jennie. Thank you, thank you, thank you. And we give thanks for a wonderful God who heard our cries. We hope this will encourage you and enable you to grow in faith. Our feelings over the last few months are summed up by the words of the Psalmist in Psalm 71 who wrote "But I will keep on hoping for your help: I will praise you more and more. I will tell everyone about your righteousness and of your saving acts all the day, for their number is past my knowledge. I will come and proclaim your mighty acts, sovereign Lord." We do indeed proclaim His mighty acts.

TIME TO RE-MEMBER

I am shortly leaving Bath and Wells for a time to serve as interim Acting Diocesan Bishop in the Diocese of Coventry. You may know that the city of Coventry saw some very heavy shelling during World War 2, which resulted in the destruction of the Cathedral.

A new Cathedral has since been built and stands alongside the old ruin as a testament of hope. Though different in style, there's a harmony of old and new. It shows us where conflict can destroy, peace can be found as we seek to live together as the people of God.

This marrying of modern and traditional styles of architecture, helps us to consider how we fashion the life we are called to live as Christians in our communities. It is not that we put aside our differences nor require others to conform to our own shape or form. Rather we recognise the value of listening fully to others and learn to hear the voice of God. Determining to value the worth of each contribution and discerning together a faithful walk with God.

This season of Remembrance encourages us to look back and to value the contributions of those who have gone before us, giving their lives in the service of others. It is not about

glorifying the concept of war and conflict but the desire to establish a peaceful world for all. As we look back, so we are invited to look forward and commit to establishing a world where all have a place and where the Prince of Peace, Jesus, is our example.

Coventry is the home to the Community of the Cross of Nails. A community of reconciliation based around the cross fashioned by iron nails found within the ruins of the Cathedral following the fire. Its mission is to live out the practice of peacebuilding, encouraging people across the world to learn to be reconciled with themselves and one another, as they find reconciliation with God, through Christ.

As I leave here, I do so with plenty of memories, many happy, occasionally sad. Often the latter are those where I have got things wrong and failed to live up to my calling to be the grace-filled child of God I long to be. So, if I have let you down, I am sorry and please pray for me, as I will for you, that God continues to reconcile us to Himself and to one another. And as we hold our acts of remembrance this month, may we become re-membered (put back together), as the people of God.

Stephen and Irene Tucker

When we present an in-person report at a church, we always include pictures and some information about the Language Mapping team that we belong to. Many readers of our newsletter don't have the opportunity to hear our reports so we thought that it is high time that we brought you up to date with who is on the team and their roles.



Matt Benjamin is the team leader and lives in Dallas. He has been on the team for over 30 years. He is now responsible for administration, innovation, development and networking.



Marcus Love is an American living in Ireland with his family. He is responsible for maps of African countries. He has created an atlas of the languages of Angola that will be published soon.



John Amdahl lives in North Carolina. His current role is special project maps for clients. In the past, he made maps for the Ethnologue for many, many different countries.



Esther Morrow is in California. She is responsible for maps of European and SE Asian countries. She also leads project development, especially the mapping software transition — see note * below.



Shauna Bladt lives in Colorado. She is taking over from Stephen as database manager. She is also the web mapping developer.



David Hildebrand lives in Edmonton, Canada. He helps with special project maps and is now using his programming knowledge to help with the mapping software transition — see note * below.



Mitchell Wimbush lives with his family in Michigan. He is responsible for maps of Asian countries. He also is involved in the mapping software transition*.



Mark Cline is in Florida and, before retiring, he worked in mapping for a utility company. Now he is responsible for maps of the Americas and Pacific.



Joe Armfield is also in Florida. He joined the team recently. He knows graphics publishing software that he has used to make maps of Papuan New Guinean languages. Now he is learning the Mapping software as well.

* Note. The mapping software transition is the move of all our maps from a very old version of the software to the modern equivalent. It encompasses a wide range of data storage issues, map layout, the rewriting of our software tools and the exporting of maps for printing.

As for ourselves, Stephen is still working full time. He is mostly continuing to write developer documentation for software he has written over the past 25 years and occasionally spending time training Shauna on its use. Recently he has had opportunity to help her improve the software. Next year, during March, he plans to attend the team meetings in Dallas and then stay on for 3 weeks when he and Shauna can concentrate on his handover to her.

Irene is happy doing the research to revise our language map data for Italy. She has finished working on the minority languages in the north and has now moved on to looking at Sardinia and the south. Outside of work, she spends a good deal of time helping her mother who is now 95. Jeanette is still living at home and finding that quite stressful. She has put her name on the waiting list to move into a local residential care home. This is a big decision for her but her life at home is increasingly difficult because she has significant heart trouble.

Threads through Creation exhibition

October 17—November 27, 2023

'Threads through Creation' is an astonishing, uplifting bible-based textile art exhibition, on show from 17th October to 27th November at Wells Cathedral.

It consists of twelve beautiful silk panels re-imagining the story of creation from the bible. They're huge – nearly 3m high and up to nearly 4m wide. It appeals to people of all ages and backgrounds, and is very family friendly.

Inspired by the poetic verses of Genesis, the first book in the Bible, textile artist Jacqui Parkinson reimagines this wonderful story in a vibrant combination of layers of silk, hand-dyed materials, metallic leathers and gold leaf, miles of thread—and more than eight million stitches!

The work is eye-catching and attractive, designed to be accessible for viewers of all ages. Whilst the serious message of God's good earth and man's impact on it underlies the entire exhibition, the panels are bold and exuberant, with many delightful quirky details such as both accurate and fanciful creatures embroidered into the stories.

<u>Writing instruments</u>: Any brand of pen, felt tip, highlighter, marker, correction fluid pot, correction tape, mechanical pencil and eraser pen regardless of their composition. Please note **no glue sticks**, wooden pencils, chalk, erasers, rulers or other cutting objects that could disturb the recycling process.
