


PARISH NURSE NEWS

Greetings Trinity family!

As the evenings turn chilly with a distinct Autumn feel and we start to spend longer hours in our houses, I thought this month I would write some advice and helpful hints on how to

avoid slips, trips and falls!

If you have two or more falls within six months you are considered to be at risk of repeated falls.



Several medical conditions can cause falls, and

they may be treatable. If you have started to have falls and previously you had no problem, you need to contact your GP to find out why.

SAFETY AT HOME!

- Remove rugs and mats, which could be trip hazards. I cared for many patients when I was District Nursing who refused to move favourite rugs and sadly then tripped, fracturing their hips which resulted in a traumatic hospital admission.
- Do not put mats on hard floors unless they are secured underneath with tape to prevent movement.

Don't allow cables to trail across walkways, and keep areas free from clutter

Have adequate lighting particularly on stairs and between the bedroom and bathroom. A plug-in night light may be helpful, as long as it gives adequate lighting.

Check stair carpet tread is in good condition

Do you need an extra stair rail to hold onto?

Highlighting the edges of steps with tape can help

Use a non-slip shower mat, and consider a grab rail in the bath/shower

Outside your home, make sure paths are even and in good repair

Don't allow slippery moss/plants to trail over pathways.

Don't be tempted to climb on chairs/steps to reach things. Place them at eye level.

Standing up is easier if chairs, toilet, and beds are slightly raised (ask me for advice on this)

Use a carrier bag for laundry and not a laundry basket.

What else can you do to avoid slips trips and falls at home?

MEDICATION

All drugs can cause side effects, and these can sometimes cause falls, especially if you are taking more than three. This could be blood pressure tablets, sleeping pills/ antidepressants, drugs affecting nerves and muscles, and those that could affect your hearts rhythm. SPEAK TO YOUR PRACTICE NURSE OR GP FOR ADVICE IF YOU START TO FALL WHILE TAKING REGULAR NEW MEDICATION

FAINTS, DIZZINESS AND LOW BLOOD PRESSURE

If you find you're having blackouts, dizzy turns, or a sense of weakness when you get up in the morning, or on standing or getting out of a warm bath this could be due to your blood pressure falling. Your blood pressure medication may make this worse. An inner ear condition may also cause a sense of head/room spinning which in turn will affect your balance and could cause a fall. Your GP can help you minimise this by showing you specific head/body movements which can help

ALCOHOL

Drinking over the recommended limit will make you more prone to falling as it can affect your balance and coordination.

EYE HEALTH

Make sure your eyes are tested regularly by an optician and glasses updated to prevent you miss stepping and falling over hazards.

MUSCLES, JOINTS AND NERVES

Nerves supplying muscles can become weak and cause falls. Muscles can become weak too after illness.

Damage to nerves.

HEALTHY EATING

Eating a well-balanced diet will help keep us fit and healthy. You may feel dizzy and lightheaded if you miss a meal, and this could cause a fall as your blood sugar level will drop. So, if you are not able to eat a large meal try to eat smaller meals more often to maintain your sugar levels.

Your GP may review your medication, check your blood pressure, and can refer you to physiotherapy or the Occupational therapist. You may also be referred to a Falls clinic. Please do ask me if you are having problems with falls and I can advise you.

OTHER NEWS!

I will be working each Monday from September 9-5pm until I can reduce my hours in my other role n a surgical unit, then I will resume my two Trinity days.

The Bereavement Journey Course I ran was a real success, with those attending really benefiting from being able to talk about their own bereavement journey in a safe space with friends. Around 12 people attending. I will be running the course again in January 2022.

Please let me or Sue Martin (Pastoral Care) know if you or a Trinity family member has been admitted to hospital. I am putting together a comfort pack for those in hospital. These will contain an olive holding cross, a comforting laminated bible verse to stand on a bedside table, tissues, a lip balm, and a bookmark with a bible verse on. If anyone would like to contribute to the cost of putting these together, please let me know, or if you can think of any additional item, which someone might find useful at a time of illness. Thankyou.

Podiatry is back on Monday 4th October from 1:30 in Trinity Hall. It is a drop-in session so please just arrive if you are struggling with your feet and are on a low income and/or not eligible for NHS care and Caroline a Registered podiatrist will be happy to treat you. The service is free, or you can give a donation if you are able.

MISSIONS

Dear Trinity Family

You may remember when we left to go to Cambodia it was with a 2 year commitment, which became 3, then 4 and then 5 1/2, and it is now a year since we arrived back in the UK. Reverse culture shock was not easy, and it has been hard to feel we were really 'home' until recently. We have much appreciated the opening up of the community and church, finally getting to know our neighbours etc. But, as has been the way for us much of this year, we are now back in America at the time of writing, for the memorial service of Mike's mother who died earlier this year, as well as selling her house. Mike, his sister, and our daughter Megan all spoke about her life at her memorial servicethe recurring theme of which was her graciousness, hospitality and determination.

Some people have asked if we are now retired now that we are "back" in the UK. The answer is 'NO'. Mike hopes to resume face to face First Response Radio (FRR) training with teams in Asia eventually. Currently he is starting work on a succession plan to ensure that FRR training can continue even after he does retire (in another 5 years or so). His proposal will include the (possible) formation of an FRR 'academy' which could offer 'rapid response radio training' to a variety of organisations. While he is able to do zoom calls now with individuals, group training via zoom will not be possible until restrictions are lifted for the teams that he would like to work with. So for now he is in a bit of 'holding pattern', liaising with and providing information for anyone interested in how to use radio to provide humanitarian relief in disaster situations, but not able to do as much as he would like.

The one thing we are certain of is that there continues to be a huge need for radio in disaster situations. A friend who used to work for the United Nations OCHA (Office for Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs) recently told Mike "There is no other organization like FRR, that provides rapid response radio within 24 hours of a disaster." When Mike told him he is restricted to the 24 countries FEBC works in, his UN friend said "The humanitarian world needs more of this on all continents across the world" and asked Mike to "Please find a way to give away the FRR solution to other outside of FEBC.

Having realized that our chances of returning to Cambodia any time soon are slim, we decided we needed to have a few bags that we had left there shipped to the UK. Even though we are not assigned there we still have many friends there and enjoy hearing about how the work at FEBCambodia is going.

The radio station staff have had to be very inventive during covid, learning how to record their various programmes from their homes, and adapt to varying levels of lockdown and curfews. Mike regularly listens to the 'whatsapp' messages that the engineering group uses, and is sometimes pleasantly surprised to find out how much Khmer language he still knows – enough at least to decipher the gist of the messages! We are still having weekly Khmer lessons with our friend Sinet to keep our grey cells active.



For several years while we lived in Cambodia, Brigit used to go to Myanmar to help with 'English camps', which provided encouragement to the local churches, as well as a gateway into the community. Since the takeover by the military earlier this year life has been very difficult, with covid numbers increasing, political and social instability, human rights abuses, increased prices and food shortages. Sadly a dear man she got to know there died of covid recently. Pray for peace and justice to return to the country.

We were very encouraged recently to hear from Mike's long-time friend, Hazeen, who is our senior FRR trainer in Pakistan. Life is hard in Pakistan with the 3rd wave of Covid-19 hitting there. Recently Hazeen accepted the challenge to pastor a church after their current pastor died. The



congregation are enjoying Hazeen's practical approach to ministry as he focuses on the practical impact of the Gospel in peoples' lives, and since he is a disaster responder he is much less academic and this lower class community really resonate with him. He has set up an aid fund as many in the church struggle to make ends meet during the pandemic and is slowly working to renovate the church and install a few fans which REALLY helps when the temperatures in June was peaking over 40C/105F!

We look forward to returning to Frome later in September. Thank you for the welcome we always feel, and continuing to pray for and support us.

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THE BRIDGE CAFÉ

" Truly I tell you, as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me."

Matthew 25 : 40

It has been a very busy and significant year for us personally, for the Bridge Café and for all involved in this lovely ministry. We began the year in Lockdown, wondering whether we could manage to undertake a limited facelift to what had become a tired looking premises. It became apparent by early Summer that the Small Business Government Grants, to which we were entitled, would be more than enough to cover rent, ongoing



expenses and a complete refurbishment. We saw this as a wonderful provision from the Lord, and a confirmation that he wanted the work, begun so faithfully by Tony and Margaret, to continue and expand.



The café was effectively gutted and a new boiler, flooring, lighting and kitchen units were installed. Redecoration and new soft furnishings and furniture have effected a complete physical transformation, appreciated by both customers and staff, but of course, this physical transformation is only a small, yet significant part of the story. At the heart of the café is what we refer to as Our Bridge Family, encompassing staff, regular customers and those on the fringes, who

occasionally drop by for a chat and drink. Most of our pre lockdown customers have gradually returned and it has been lovely to renew friendships. Others have still not come back, but we pray for them and entrust them into the care of our loving Heavenly Father. Prayer is at the heart of all that we do and without it we could not function. The team of faithful volunteers meets fortnightly to talk and pray, and these are precious, life-giving times, when we are re energized and envisioned for the work.

It is essentially a work of love and grace, in which we seek to serve our Lord by loving and caring for those who come into the café, seeking to see the image of Christ in each one, and ministering to them as we would to Jesus Himself. Many, though not all, of our Bridge family have become marginalised in one way or another, through mental, emotional, learning or physical disability, or financial difficulties. The café is a place where they can

rest and enjoy caring company, nutritious, affordable food and CAB advice from Tony if needed. We preach the Good News primarily in loving deeds, though we are always ready to give an account of the hope we have in Christ, should people ask us. Our Fortnightly Teas, which should recommence this Autumn, are an excellent opportunity for us to share the love of God in a more challenging way, as they feature a short Christian message, alongside the lavish tea and fun Board games.





You can become involved in the ministry of The Bridge Café, primarily by praying for us. At the moment the team comprises John and Wendy Rootes, Audrey Lyons, Susie Hicks, Richard Loveless, Jackie Platt and Felicity Hill, and Tony continues with his CAB advice. Once our fortnightly teas recommence, there will be opportunities for more volunteers to join us, so please get in touch if you are interested.

At some point, it will be possible to purchase £3.50 vouchers at the back of the church or from the office. You can either keep these to give to anyone for a meal at the café or give to us to be used when customers struggle to pay. Our food tends to be heavily subsidized to enable everyone to have the opportunity of a drink or meal out, something most of us take for granted.

Another thing you can do is to come down yourselves to the café to eat and drink. It would help with our takings, but it is also an excellent way of getting to know people you would never perhaps meet in your daily lives. Who knows what friendships and opportunities to share God's love might develop? We would love to see you. In case you don't know, the café is at the corner of Trinity Street and Selwood Road, in the heart of

our Parish, and we are open Tuesday to Friday from 11am to 1.30pm.

Eco Church...



"²⁴ How many are your works, LORD!

In wisdom you made them all." Psalm 104 verse 24.

For my daily Bible readings, I choose the IBRA (International Bible Reading Association) notes, partly because each week there is a contributor from a different part of the world and often from a different worship tradition. I find it so important to remember that God's Family is multi national, multi cultural and yet held together by a common faith. Recently the contributor was writing from Brazil, and she based one of her contributions on Psalm 104. (Do look it up, it s a magnificent reminder of how wonderfully God has created the world). The Brazilian contributor focused on verse 13.. "

He waters the mountains from his upper chambers;

the land is satisfied by the fruit of his work."

She then asked whether, if these words were addressed to us humans, whether the Earth would be satisfied with the fruit of our work. Whether we are using all our advances in technology, progress, development to benefit the creation we have been charged with...and the very recent report from the UN Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change report underlines that the Earth would most certainly not be satisfied. Indeed it makes very frightening reading. So frightening that it is very easy to plant our heads firmly in the sand and say..."it's far too great a problem..Let governments sort it out". Governments must indeed be a very important part of the solution. But we also have a responsibility to do our little bit. We are charged with care for Creation, not its destruction.

So, on a local level, what could we do? Well, Frome Town Council is joining in "The Big Green Week" in the run up to COP26, and as part of that Holy Trinity will be joining with the other churches to repeat the Frome Churchyard BioDiversity Trail on Sunday 26th September, starting at Holy Trinity at 2.00, and moving on to the Dissenters' Cemetery, Christchurch and St John's. 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
